CARE Parcel Brings Thanks From Vienna

Words of thanks in grateful, touching terms were expressed by a letter from Vienna, Austria, typographer for a CARE package sent to him recently by the Union Labor News, official publication of the Madison Federation of Labor, 201 1/2 E. Mifflin st. The Viennese typographer is Joseph Pajones. His letter was received at the federation offices this week, according to Richard Huffman, editor of the Union Labor News and an employee of The State Journal.

Pajones acknowledged receipt of the package and pointed out that he has a "perpetually sickly wife" and that he himself suffers from a diseased lung. "You have rendered us a great service and have erected in our hearts a monument of charity for a long time. You have put hope and confidence in my poor soul." He then enumerated the items received in the CARE package and expressed particular delight over receipt of powdered milk and bee honey. Requests Picture Typographers the world over, he said were "brothers and friends in spite of war and revolutions and we are yet here!" Pajones put in a request for a

picture of his Madison benefactors and extended an invitation for them to visit Austria for the 100th anniversary celebration of the Strauss waltz. He also included a picture booklet of Vienna in his letter.

For the information of the Madison typographers, he traced the history of the "printer-society" to which he belongs in Vienna. He described the end of the Hitler regime as "happy days of deliverance." Outlines Work Details of the work involved in rebuilding workshops destroyed by war were also included. Pajones said that the Viennese typographer works 48 hours a week, nine and one-half hours daily for five days. He is allowed eight paid holidays, he said. He concluded his letter with a plea that "workmen of all countries be united in the struggle for democracy (democracy) and human laws." "Fight for a perpetual peace," he urged "and for a better and new beautiful life on this earth."
