

Truman, Brazilian Chief Executive Agree on Plan to Knit Nations Together

WASHINGTON, May 21. (AP) The White House announced today that the Presidents of the United States and Brazil have agreed on a new five-point program designed to draw the two nations even closer together.

The program mainly involves U. S. economic, financial and technical help to Brazil, joint efforts to eliminate double taxation, and Brazilian measures to stimulate American private investment in that republic.

It also was decided to negotiate a treaty to expand the present cultural exchange between the two nations.

Details of the program will be worked out later.

Israel-Syria Truce Remote

HAMILTON, N. Y., May 21. (AP) Dr. Ralph Bunche sees no promise of success in armistice negotiations between Israel and Syria.

Bunche, acting United Nations mediator for the Middle East, touched on negotiations for Syria's withdrawal from the Holy Land in a speech last night. His university's fourth annual series of lectures in human relations.

"Progress in these negotiations has been very slow thus far and it can not be predicted when they will end or, indeed, whether they will be successful," Bunche said.

He termed the United Nations the indispensable catalytic agent in the process of finding agreement among nations.

Woman Dies, Others Hurt in U. P. Railway Accident

SALT LAKE CITY, May 21. (AP) A Minnesota woman traveling west with her railroad engineer-husband died last night when the rear truck of a Union Pacific passenger car slipped from the rails and jolted for a quarter of a mile over the ties.

Nine others were injured when they tumbled from seats after the rear car on the Union Pacific westbound Los Angeles Limited was derailed at Emery, Utah. The car remained upright.

Mrs. George Jensen, 63, Minneapolis, died of a heart attack as the limited ground to a halt at about 5 p. m., 50 miles east of Ogden, Utah, and 26 miles west of Evanston, Wyo.

Her 65-year-old husband suffered a broken left leg. Jensen

War at Shanghai Hits Travel, Liner Sails With Space

Cancellations of reservations for the westward voyage across the Pacific because of the war around Shanghai was responsible for the sailing of the S. S. President Wilson from here last night far short of her passenger capacity, line spokesmen revealed.

Developments in China have discouraged travel in that direction.

The Wilson, one of the two giant A. P. L. liners in the Pacific, is taking only a handful of passengers giving their destination as Shanghai, although a considerable number are going to Hong Kong. Many boarded the vessel here for Honolulu in the absence of foreseen accommodations on Matson's Lurline, delayed in the islands by the longshoremen's strike. A few are booked for Yokohama and Manila.

McKinnon, Fairfax, Va., assigned as public affairs officer of the U. S. embassy in Manila, with his wife and two daughters.

A. F. L. Heads Give Views on T.-H. Act

CLEVELAND, May 21. (AP) Leaders of the American Federation of Labor believe the most extreme method of handling a "national emergency" strike should be government seizure of the plant.

But under no circumstances, said the A. F. L. executive council in a statement, should a court injunction be used to force a strike.

The council ended a five-day quarterly meeting yesterday with its views on how far it is willing to compromise on new federal labor legislation. The point on national emergency stoppages was one of four.

The other compromises approved by the A. F. L.:

A requirement that employers as well as union leaders should sign non-Communist affidavits.

A requirement that unions file financial reports. A guarantee of free speech for employers in dealing with workers, short of intimidation or coercion.

Otherwise, the A. F. L. still backs the Thomas-Lesinski bill offered by the Truman administration. This calls for repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act with "certain improvements."

Boy, 4, Kills Baby Brother

LOS ANGELES, May 21. (AP) A misplaced pistol was blamed today in the fatal shooting of 2-year-old Luis Gonzales by his brother, aged 4.

The father, Simon Gonzales, was called home from his job yesterday because his wife was ill. He found little Luis dying in a cradle outside.

Louis' brother, Ernest, had found an "unloaded gun" which his father kept in a dresser drawer, police reported.

Tito Doubts War Near, Warns Army Against Everyone

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, May 21. (AP) Premier Marshal Tito said yesterday he does not believe the cold war will become an armed conflict in the near future.

"The powers are unprepared, and the people in imperialistic countries are unwilling to fight," he told his crack guards division in a speech. The guards, along with the security police, protect Yugoslav leaders from foreign and domestic enemies.

Tito is on the outskirts with Russia and her satellites but has not lined up with the western powers either. He cautioned his guards to be wary of both "class enemies" and disciples of the Cominform.

The Yugoslav chief blamed Russia for increasingly bitter relations between his country and its Communist neighbors.

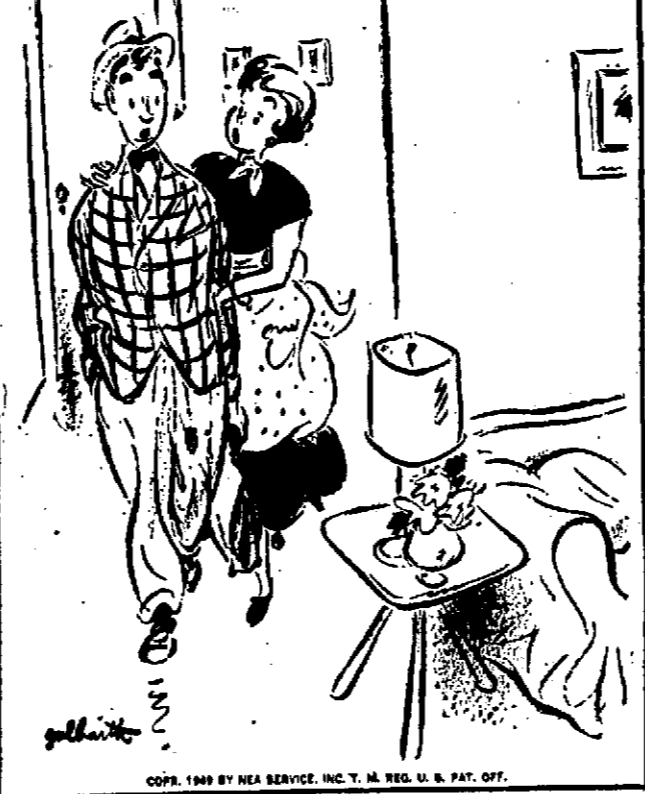
