Q. HOW MUCH energy can be obtained from the human body? W. T. S.

A. The amount of energy that can be obtained from the hu-man body is small. It is equiv-

alent to only about one-tenth horsepower per adult male. Q. What animals are the slowest in moving? G. R. D.

A. Sloths and snails are com-monly believed to be the slowest creatures but the burrowing earthworm has been found to be slower. A sloth can be incited to move at one mile per hour, a snail to 23 inches per hour, according to measurements that have been made.

Q. What is the approximate ost of a United States battleship? B. W. B.

A. According to the Department of the Navy the latest and best battleships during the last war average \$104,000,000 per ship (Iowa class, 45,000 tons).

Q. Which is warmer, slik or wool? R. D. M.




