

Record Dive Time Below Surface Told

Q. IS THE POEM, "Bivouac of the Dead" in all National Cemeteries or only in some of them? C. W.

A. The Department of the Army says that verses from the poem "Bivouac of the Dead" are not inscribed in all National Cemeteries. They do appear in certain of the older National Cemeteries but are not found in those established in recent years.

Q. In the record dive that was made early this year by a Navy man, how long did the diver remain below the surface of the water? P. D.

A. The diver, Harold Weisbrod, BM 1, U. S. N., stayed at the record depth of 561 feet for 1½ minutes before starting the process of decompression, which lasted 3 hours 18 minutes. The dive was made in a water-filled pressure tank at the Experimental Diving Unit, Naval Gun Factory, Washington, D. C.

Q. Is the "paraffin test" an accurate one to find out whether or not a person has fired a gun? R. C.

A. The Federal Bureau of Investigation says that the test referred to is probably one in which melted paraffin is poured on the hands of a person be-lieved to have fired a gun, in order to pick up burned and unburned powder particles result-ing from the explosion of the cartridge in the weapon. The ing from the explosion of the cartridge in the weapon. The reaction resulting from telling the insides of the paraffin casts thus obtained by the application of chemical reagents indicates the presence or absence of nitrates present in burned and unburned powder particles. The results do not distinguish between these particles and other nitrate particles and the test is, therefore, not a true test for gunpowder residues.
