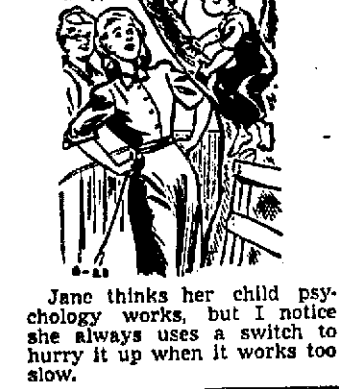

He'd be able to appreciate television as well as the next cliff dweller.

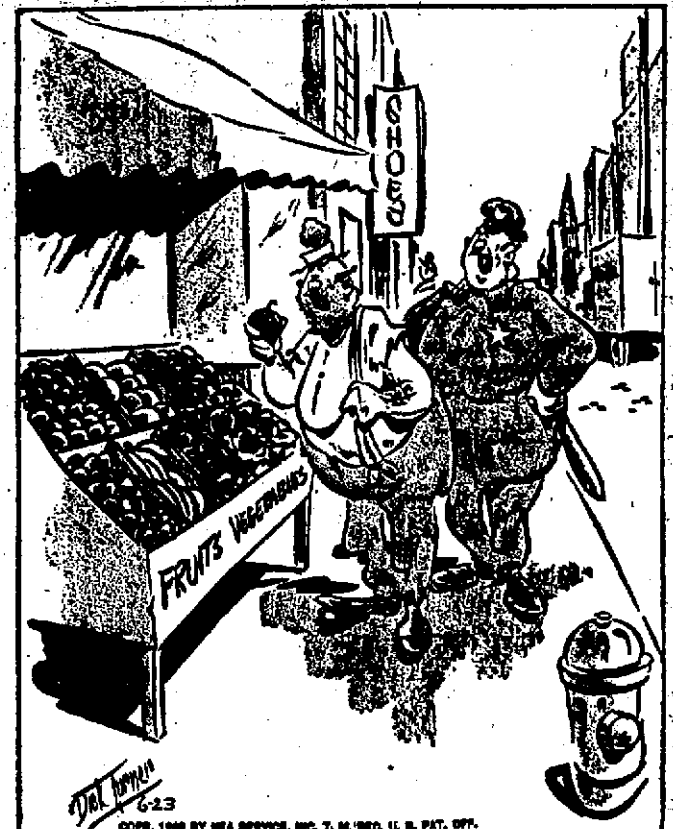
Knight is convinced that mankind's biggest defeat is his failure to develop spiritually.
