Earliest Newspaper Guarded in Boston

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—(U.P.)—An original copy of the first issue of the first newspaper printed in the United States cost its owner nothing. Now he keeps it locked in a bank vault. When Albert J. LeBourdais of Cambridge bought an old Bible for \$15 some 25 years ago he didn't bother at first to look at the yellowed sheet folded between two pages. When he got around to it later, he found issue "Numb. 1" of The Boston News-Letter, published 245 years ago on April 24, 1704. Published by Postmaster John Campbell, the News-Letter's main story was nearly four months old, even though it had come from London by "flying-post." The dispatch noted the "increase in Papist and Jesuit priests lately come to Scotland from France," and noted that the French king might send troops there in an early version of an amphibious landing to give assistance to the Stuart pretender to the throne.

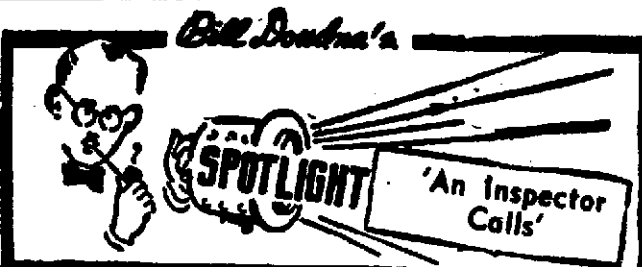

'An Inspector Calls'

It's almost a tradition for Wisconsin Players' summer playbills to include an outstanding performance, a characterization of such quality that it promises to linger long in memory. The 1949 season opened Thursday night with such a performance. The play was J. B. Priestley's "An Inspector Calls"; the actor was Ordean Ness.

The drama will be repeated at 8 tonight and at 8 p. m. Saturday. No seats are available for sale for the last performance. All season tickets have been sold, and only a few seats will be offered for the rest of the play.

Ness played his role with a cool intensity—the coolness and intensity of steel. From the moment he appeared, the stage was his—even after he had left it in the last act. The inspector's precise questioning in his investigation of a suicide carried the play through to what appeared to be its climax; and the results of that questioning led to the real and startling one.

Ness' calm, piercing, and powerful portrayal of that imperturbable man—master of every situation through his certainty of what

er's keeper. Their sins of omission or commission based, the family watched the inspector leave, then (with two exceptions) settled down to explaining it all away, pretending it had never happened. These two—the Birling's son and daughter—found their consciences vindicated by the shock of the play's climax.

Eugene Van Hinkle drew a penetrating picture of the wealthy son, and Marjorie Parkin was genuine as the daughter Paul F. Hunter, Jr., made the father more the priggish bumbler than was necessary, thereby thinning the role's realism. Nancy Erchstadt, as the mother, did beautifully with her major scene but otherwise tried too hard to make her the perfect snob. Charles Webster's characterization of the fiancée was weak.
