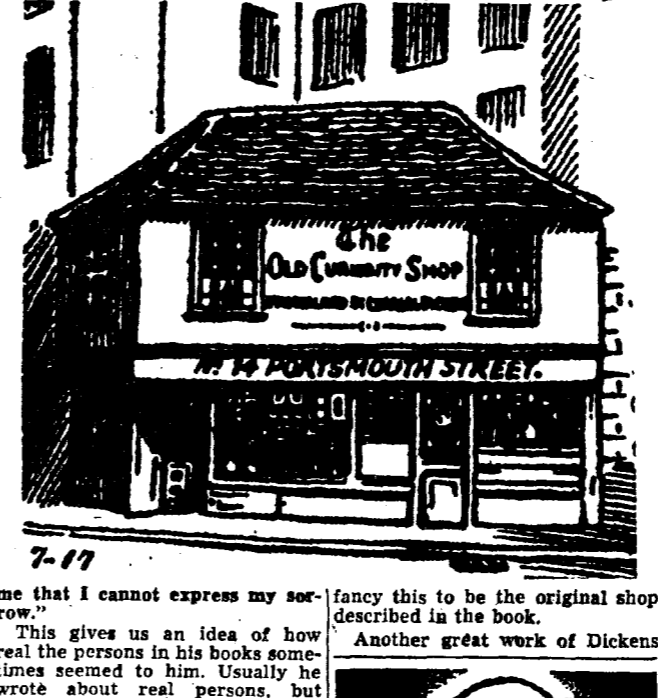
The Sunday Crossword Puzzle
