Battleship Operation **Costs Told**

By HASKIN

Q. HOW MUCH does it cost to operate the battleship Mis-souri for one day at sea, person-nel included? H. J. N.

A. The cost is given officially as approximately \$18,000 a day.

Q. When was the American Bar Association formed? F. H. A. The American Bar Associa-tion was founded in 1878 "to uphold the honor of the legal pro-fession and to promote uniformity of legislation throughout the United States." The national headquarters is in Chicago.

Q. Did the Navy use Japanese silk for its powder bags in World War II? Q. H. A. Much of the silk in powder

bags was Japanese silk, of which the Navy had a large stock at the outbreak of the war.

Q. What is the actual value of the silver in each of the silver coins? R. J. S.

A. The approximate bullion value of silver in United States coins at the current market rate of 71½ cents per troy ounce, .999 fine is: Dollar, .55 cents; half dollar, .26 cents; quarter, .13 cents; dime, 5 cents.


Q. What tests must an alien pass before he is finally admitted to the United States? I. K. A. The act of 1924 charged

American consuls stationed in foreign countries with primary responsibility for the selection of immigrants. Their approvals are, however, not necessarily fi-nal. As vessels approach ports of entry, immigrants are inspected by representatives of the United States Public Health Service, traveling documents are scrutinized by immigration officials attached to the Immigra-tion and Naturalization Service, and travelers' possessions are evaluated by customs officials. If all is in order, aliens are ad-mitted without further hin-drance; if irregularities are discovered, they may be detained until the matter is satisfactorily adjusted or debarred from en-trance. Appeal may be taken from the decisions of immigration officials (but not those of consuls) to the Board of Immigration Appeals in the Department of Justice.
