"Blossoms in the Dust" is based on the story of Mrs. Edna Gladney, a Texas woman, with the death of her only child, turned to helping other babies. She became superintendent of the Texas Children's Home and Aid society and was instrumental in overhauling her state's laws so that children born out of wedlock could take their places in community life.

There's an interesting story behind the production of the picture. Here's how the producers say it happened: "Some time before the film was started, an important man in the M-G-M studios and his wife were eagerly awaiting the arrival of an heir. The baby died at birth. The mother was heartbroken and seemed to be falling deeper and deeper into a state of melancholy. The only solution, said the family doctor, was for the couple to adopt a child. These things are sooner said than done, however, and finally the man in desperation sent out an SOS to various M-G-M colleagues in the field.

"Soon afterwards a representative in Dallas wrote that there was a woman in nearby Ft. Worth who specialized in caring for foundlings and placing them in good homes. He added that, he among many others, admired the fine work this woman was doing. The M-G-M executive rushed to Dallas, met the fieldworker, and soon was introduced to Mrs. Edna Gladney. Not long afterwards a baby was found for the visitor and his wife. But meanwhile he had become so impressed with the work she was doing that, upon his return to the studio, he was bubbling with news of Mrs. Gladney's achievements.

"This led to the production of the picture, a story thought up by Ralph Wheelwright of the studio, and adapted for the screen by Anita Loos."
