Game Violators Fined \$700, Jailed by Hurley Court

HURLEY —(P)—Two Chicago men drew a total of \$700 in fines and 60 days in jail or 620 days in jail in Iron county court Wednesday for game law violations.
Richard Anderson and Ernest Koehm both pleaded guilty.
Judge R. C. Trembath gave Koehm his choice of \$400 in fines and 30 days in jail or 360 days in jail on charges of carrying a resident fishing license not his own; having a fawn deer in his possession which was killed during a closed season, and hunting during the closed season.
Koehm did not indicate which alternate he would select.
Anderson paid \$300 in fines and began serving 30 days in jail for possessing the fawn deer, hunting during a closed season and hunting and fishing without licenses.
He was given an alternative of 260 days in jail.
Benny Max Montreal, Wis., pleaded guilty and was fined \$33 and costs for transferring his hunting and fishing license to Koehm.
The Chicagoans were arrested Sunday by Game Warden Warren Hoiger, after fishing near Mercer
