Telecasting of Football by Remote Control Is Termed Success in East

NEW YORK, Oct. 19. (AP) After two transmissions, remote telecasting of football has proved itself on a full network basis. The games have been those from the Notre Dame gridiron at South Bend, Ind.

WKBK and WGN-TV of Chicago are co-operating with the DuMont network in handling the contests. At least a half-dozen or so more relays are to come, including big nine battles at other points. They will be Wisconsin vs. Ohio State Saturday at Madison, Michigan vs. Illinois at Champaign the next week, and Wisconsin vs. Northwestern at Evanston, Ill., Nov. 3.

Three games remain on the Notre Dame Telecast schedule, the next Nov. 12 with North Carolina to be played at New York. The other two will be back in South Bend.

The South Bend pickups have introduced several improved techniques in football camera work. For one thing an extra camera has been placed in the end zone to give a contrasting view of some of the action, such as goal kicks. Also closer close-ups have been effected as a result of changes in the telescope lens.

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Careful Observation Insured Making Six No Trump Bid

TODAY'S hand was sent to me by Robert H. Jamison of Miami, Fla. Mr. Jamison wrote that every player at some time runs across what he considers the most interesting hand in bridge and his time came when he and his partner optimistically arrived at a six no trump contract on this hand. I will say this for Mr. Jamison—his careful observation of the drop of the cards made it possible for him to make the contract.

When the dummy went down, he thought that the only chance he had was to find the queen of spades in the East hand. If that worked, he could make three spade tricks, four hearts (if the hearts broke), four diamonds and the king of clubs.

He won the first trick with the king of clubs and then ran his four diamond "tricks." On the fourth diamond West let go the three of hearts. Mr. Jamison then proceeded to run his four heart tricks, discarding his dence of clubs on the fourth heart. East carefully clung to his spades, trying to deceive declarer into thinking that he held the spade suit. West discarded first the eight of clubs and then the jack of clubs.

Declarer now decided that West was trying to protect the queen of spades, so at this point he led a club, which West was forced to win with the ace. Then he had to lead a spade into declarer's king-jack and small. "It did not matter to Mr. Jamison who held the queen of spades now."

East argued that his partner should have discarded the nine of spades instead of the jack of clubs. However, Mr. Jamison claimed that unless West had made the nine of spades discard on the fourth diamond, he would have read what he was trying to do, and would have cashed the ace and king of spades, dropping the queen.

Says Outside Video Aerials Will Remain

LOS ANGELES, (AP) Colored television is still five years away and outside aerials will be necessary for many years, believes President Ross D. Siragusa of the Admiral Television and Radio Corp.

He told a television dealer meeting here that his company will do a \$110,000,000 business this year and is planning a west coast assembly plant in Los Angeles. "The industry is producing 300,000 sets a month," he said, "but the demand is beginning to exceed the supply."

Siragusa said he did not believe television and motion pictures were a threat to each other, because theaters need only one show every few days and television needs several shows a day which can only be run once.

He predicted that Los Angeles would become the nation's TV show center when the cross-country coaxial cable is installed.
