## Many Grid Games Across Nation on Air Tomorrow; Benny's Rating Climbs

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 (AP)—With CBS going right along with its multiple gridiron broadcasts, NBC has decided to start augmenting its football pickup.

Saturday it will divide network coverage between two games, Michigan vs. Minnesota at Ann Arbor, on the air from 1:45 p. m. (e. s. t.) with Tom Duggan talking, and Southern Methodist vs. Kentucky at Dallas, due to start at 3 p. m. (e. s. t.) with Bill Stern as speaker.

The first game will have full rights of way until the second starts. Then alternating descriptions will be in order until end of the first, with S. M. U. Ky. winding up the broadcast.

As usual CBS is starting its three-hour roundup at 2:30 (e. s. t.) with Red Barber as guide in New York. Of the 20 games on the list, Columbia-Army, Navy-Penn, Minnesota-Michigan, Ohio State-Wisconsin and Missouri-Iowa State will get most attention.

The other radio network games, all time is eastern standard: ABC 1:45—Michigan-Minnesota, Harry Wismer and Jim Gibbons announcing. MBS 1:55—Columbia-Army at West Point, Al Heller and Bob Wolff.

The principal television event, again via a 20-station hookup of Dumont, is Ohio State-Wisconsin at Madison, to start on the air at 2:50.

NBC-TV and its eastern stations will divide attention between these games, all starting around 1:30: Navy-Penn at Philadelphia to five cities; Yale-Holy Cross at New Haven to three cities, Columbia-Army to two cities and Harvard-Dartmouth at Cambridge to Boston only.

Despite competition from NBC's recently introduced giveaway, Hollywood Calling, Jack Benny of CBS has jumped from eighth to within a hair of first place in the latest Hooper program report.

Jack is topped only by Radio Theater which, with 19.9 per cent, managed to hold first by three-tenths of a point. Bob Hope went up one place to third, dropping Godfrey's Talent Scouts to fourth. Fibber and Molly held fifth, with Walter Winchell moving up one position to sixth and My Friend Irma dropping into seventh from second.

To complete the first 10, Inner Sanctum was eighth; Red Skelton, now back on the air via CBS instead of NBC, was ninth, and Mr. Keen was 10th.

Another returning show, Charlie McCarthy, was 11th.

# West Lost 800 Points on One Spade Bid Over One Diamond

One can always tell when there is a real bridge addict in a dining room. He will have a pencil in his hand, writing on the tablecloth. As a matter of fact, Neal Lang, general manager of the Park Sheraton Hotel in New York City, has provided a special pad for me in the dining room, so I will not ruin the tablecloth when I start discussing bridge hands.

The other day Lang and I were lunching together, and he asked me if I had run across any interesting hands lately. Out came the pencil, and forgetting all about the special pad, here is the hand we put on the tablecloth.

West felt quite justified in making a simple overcall of one spade over South's one diamond bid, especially in view of the fact that South had passed originally. Unfortunately, he ran across a pretty good hand in the North. It took a little nerve on the part of South to pass the double, but he made the correct call. He had passed originally, and he had made a bid of one diamond over his partner's club bid. But North said, "Sorry, partner, I do not think we have a game, but I can beat this one spade bid."

North opened the king of diamonds, cashed the queen and led the third diamond which South won with the ace. South then made the correct shift to a spade and West made the mistake of playing the nine. North won with the ten and cashed the ace and king of trumps.

North now had a very good reading of the South hand. He knew that South originally held three-four-card suits. Diamonds had gone three rounds. South had bid a diamond with only a four-card diamond suit. Why would he have bid diamonds if he had held a five-card suit? North knew now that he could hope to make only one club trick, so he cashed the ace of clubs, then led back a trump. There was nothing West could do to keep from losing two heart tricks, as he could not get into dummy to take the heart finesse.

Thus West lost 800 points on a one bid.


