On the Air Waves

Ed Wynn, Milton Berle May Race for Video Title

NEW YORK, Oct. 24. (AP) Ed Wynn, veteran of the stage who contributed plenty to radio comedy as the "Fire Chief" in the days of Graham McNamee, has taken avidly to television. The viewers seem to like it as much as he does. Ed's show, telecast live in Hollywood and reproduced from film recordings by other stations of the CBS-TV network, has adapted most of the techniques he perfected in his radio days. But television enables him to heighten the effect. Wynn's many hats and costumes help out along this line. Coincidentally, Milton Berle on NBC-TV is working for the same sponsor that paid Wynn's way on the radio a decade or so ago. With Wynn now active in the field that has labeled Berle as "Mr. Television," there is a possibility that a race for comedy honors may develop.

Studio one is going right ahead with its televised drama, "Battleship Bismarck." The play is based on the sinking of this German warship by the British in 1941. It has been hoped to find a survivor in this country to help in preparing the program. About the only reaction to the search was an overseas telephone call from Barkard von Mueller, officer on the Bismarck and was now practicing law in Frankfurt, Germany. He said there were 110 survivors, but as far as he knew none was in the United States. Von Mueller said he learned of the telecast from a news story. Parker Fennelly, who has acted in as many "down east" roles as anyone else in network radio, has another upcoming in "Mr. Feathers," a story centered in the drug store of a small New England town. It will start on MBS next month as replacement for another "down east" story, "Scattergood Baines."

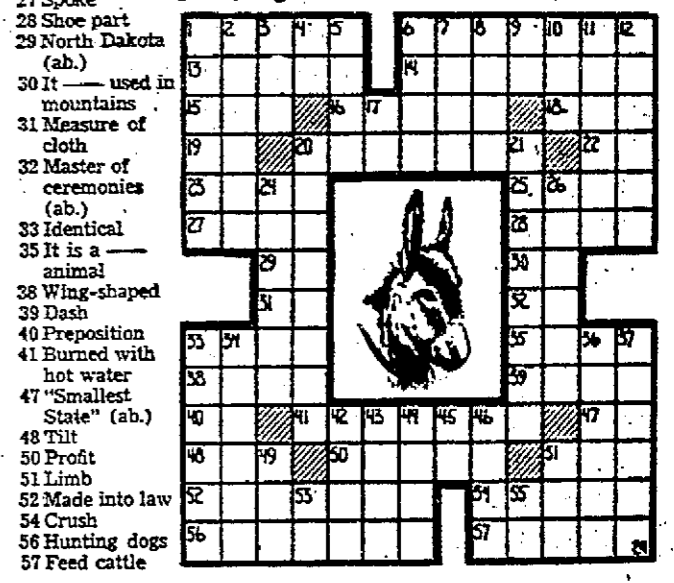
'Sisters of Skillet' Together Again

West picked up the queen of clubs, and Miss Sobel smilingly asked East to lead a diamond—and then it happened. The little old lady said she had no diamonds. Now the director told her she was free to lead whatever she wanted, and she led a small club. When Miss Sobel played the nine from dummy, West won the trick with the ten-spot, led back a diamond and East ruffed. The little old lady came back with a club. West won it with the queen and led back another diamond... and Miss Sobel's perfectly sound contract of four hearts was defeated.
