



TIP OF THE MORNING: Charles Laughton, movie star, is on tour, giving evenings of readings from the Bible, Shakespeare, Dickens, and others. He'll be in Milwaukee Nov. 28—but don't be surprised if he comes to Madison a few days later.

Kendall Clark, a 1933 graduate of the University of Wisconsin, will make his first visit to Madison as a professional actor when the Margaret Webster Shakespearean troupe plays here Nov. 17 and 18. Clark, a former member of the Wisconsin Players, will appear in "The Taming of the Shrew" the first night, and in "Julius Caesar" the second afternoon and night.

Clark's 14 active years in the theater began with a part in the Eva Le Gallienne production of "L'Aiglon." This was followed by the role of Gustave in "Camille." During the next year he started a successful association with the Theater Guild, stage-managing "End of Summer" and appearing in "Storm Over Patsy" with Sara Allgood and "The Ghost of Yankee Doodle" with Ethel Barrymore and Dudley Digges.

While playing in "George Washington Slept Here" Clark was drafted, and in the five years that followed took part in the Normandy invasion and other campaigns in the ETO.

Returning to Broadway in 1945, he went into the role of Major Robinson in "Home of the Brave." Since then he has appeared with Tallulah Bankhead in "The Eagle Has Two Heads," stage-managed her revival of "Private Lives," appeared with Jane Cowl in "The First Mrs. Fraser," and participated in 15 dramatic programs over NBC television. For four seasons he has been leading man at the Berkshire Playhouse, Stockbridge, Mass.

## Margaret's St. Louis Debut Captures Plaudits of Critics

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UP)—St. Louis music critics applauded Margaret Truman Sunday as a singer with a pleasing voice and "distinct promise."

The 25-year-old president's daughter made her St. Louis vocal debut Saturday night before 3,591 persons. Her mother, Vice-President Alben W. Barkley and his frequent date, Mrs. Carleton S. Hadley, were in the audience.

"Her voice projects well except in the lower range. A good ear was apparent in prevailingly accurate intonation." Harry R. Burke of the Globe-Democrat said, "Miss Truman is a sincere artist with distinct promise."

"Her voice was fluent and rich throughout its register. She used it with discrimination in phrasing, with clarity and fluidity," Burke said.

Miss Truman's appearance as guest soloist with the St. Louis Symphony orchestra developed into a major social event. All tickets were sold days in advance and hundreds of concert-goers were turned away at the doors of the Kiel Auditorium opera house.

Performance Repeated. A soprano, Miss Truman sang "Dove Song" from the "Marriage of Figaro," and "O Mio Bambino" from Puccini's "Gianni Schicchi," and two encores. She repeated the performance in a recital Sunday.
