

TIP O' THE MORNING: Don't believe that statement in a national magazine that Dr. John A. Schindler of Monroe has turned down all requests to appear on networks. He has accepted an invitation to discuss "How to Live 100 Years" on the University of Chicago Round Table at 12:30 p. m. Sunday (WMAQ).

SUNDAY CONCERT: Cecil Leeson, saxophone recitalist who will appear at the Wisconsin Union theater Sunday will play a program including works written especially for the event.

Playing Northwestern university songs, the musicians will form the letters "N" and "U" in script—and the letters will appear to be identical on both sides of the field at Evanston. The formations also will include a brightly shining sun.
