# Gilbert Sounds the 'Ayes'

The way Al Gilbert figures it, the people around here like just about every kind of music, but tastes have improved over the years, especially among the younger listeners.

Gilbert, who conducts four record sessions every week-day morning on WIBA, takes his job pretty seriously. He wants to give everybody some of the kind of music he prefers, without destroying the balance of the programs and without using such a preponderance of the majority's requests that he drives everybody else away.

Al goes on the air at 6 a.m. with "Sunrise Frolic," then has three "Mu-

sical Clock" segments, divided by news broadcasts. A few weeks ago, he began asking his listeners to tell him their preferences in types of music and to let him know during which periods they heard the show. Hundreds of

them wrote to him.

Then Al tabulated the letters and postcards, getting a good cross-section of what Madison and out-of-town lis-




