Burns and Allen Musical Chief Started Early

Harry Lubin's assignment as music director of CBS' "Burns and Allen Show" (KTSa, Wednesday, 9 p.m.) is the highlight of a career which began when he was in knee breeches.

At the age of five, Lubin was something of a veteran at the fiddle. At the ripe old age of six, he decided to turn to the piano.

He was born in New York City of Russian parents. His father for many years was a music director for the Yiddish theater, and all of his four children had musical talent.

Harry was just 14 when he landed his first paying job, playing piano in a movie house. He went to work each day after classes at Stuyvesant High school and pounded away at atmospheric melody until late in the evening.

Industry Finding Jobs For Disabled Workers

With delegates present from Hawaii, Puerto Rico and every one of the 48 states, members of the National Rehabilitation Association Conference swung into the first day of their annual convention Tuesday. Executive and special committees have been meeting since Sunday.

"The structure of industry today is such that it lends itself more than ever to the effective employment of people having disabilities," declared J. H. Bond, Dallas, regional representative of the Federal Security Agency.

"The great range of occupations, the rapidly improving conditions of all types of employment and the subdivision of work in modern industry all open new and greater opportunities for the selective placement of physically handicapped."

Bond continued: "It is a conclusively established fact, demonstrated over a period of years, that every dollar invested in rehabilitation is returned to our economy thirty-fold. Good business then is also an aspect of our brand of rehabilitation, and the fact that there is no investment which yields such an immediate and rich return is only further proof that in our society the best possible business is an investment in people."
