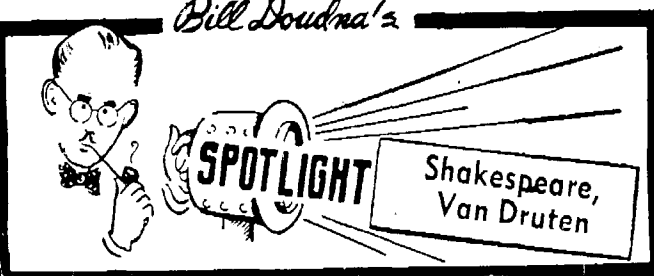

TIP O' THE MORNING: Attention "Hornblower" fans: Gregory Peck will play the title role in "Capt. Horatio Hornblower," to be filmed in London beginning about Jan. 15.

Madison had its choice Friday night of two plays—William Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar" at the Wisconsin Union theater and John Van Druten's "I Remember Mama" at West High school.

The Madison Theater Guild opened its season with the tender story of Mama Harson and her bank account, which introduced Robert Merriman as the group's director.

Grace Dunshee was the taciturn, wholesome, and hard-working Norwegian mother, and she played the role with an alert sensitivity for the kind of woman Mama must have been. Her strength was in her very mildness and a sort of spirituality which kept her family from slipping into poverty.

Jeanne Remus Neher was Katrina, the daughter ambitious for success in writing, around whose story the play was built. Mrs. Neher gave the girl some of Mama's spirituality, and made transitions smoothly from narrative to participation in the play's scenes. If there was any fault in her interpretation, it was a little too much of seriousness—this Katrina was always intense, never smiling.

Worth more mention than the space available here were Robert West, as the unobtrusive Papa; Maurine Schweppe, as Christine, the realist of the family; Rachel Steensland, as the maiden aunt who finally won a man; Walter Malec, as Mr. Thorkelson, the timid underwriter; and Paul Hunter, Jr., as the bustling Uncle Chris, who managed to hide his real kindness until his death. A word must go, too, to Eleanor Grant for her vignette of a successful novelist.

Under Merriman's direction, the play ran smoothly through its many scenes, telling its simple story with directness and clarity. It will be repeated at 8 tonight in East high school. Friday night's performance was a sell-out; only a few tickets remain for tonight's.

"Julius Caesar" By HELEN MATHESON
Another of Shakespeare's stately plays sprang smack into the midst of 1949 Friday night.

And "Julius Caesar" emerged as tingling contemporary drama. A capacity Wisconsin Union theater audience followed the story of patriotic rebellion against tyranny as intently as though it did not know the noblest Roman of all must die in the end.

Margaret Webster's fast-paced Shakespeare on-wheels company treats the bard with respect—but intelligent respect.

It treats his plays as drama, not ritual. And it strips off ponderous tradition and leaves them bare for exciting action.

"Julius Caesar" was played in modern dress and acted with authentic style and realism that skillfully focused attention on the parallels between the tyrannies of his generation and ours.

David Lewis was a gallant Brutus—courageous, resolute, sincere, constantly haunted by the tragedy of killing the leader he loved. He managed to make the role both credible and moving.

John Straub was a persuasive, temper-riffed Cassius and Frederick Rold, a splendid Caesar—demented by his own grandeur yet still touched with the qualities of greatness.

Kendall Clark's mannered diction detracted somewhat from his portrayal of Mark Antony, although he managed the difficult scene in the senate confidently and proved himself a compelling rabble-rouser in his address to the mob.

Actors in supporting roles were almost without exception excellent and Louisa Horton's brief bit as Brutus' courageous wife bid the news of her death a few scenes later actually touching.

The mood of several of the crucial scenes was powerfully built.

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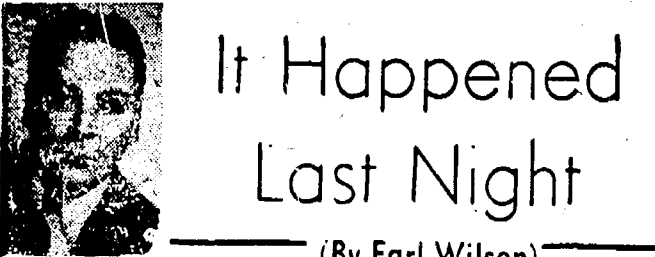

The B. W. who trusts me and vice versa, said I could go.

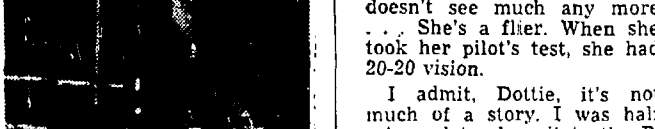
About an hour before came a phone call—Could I meet Yvonne at Ed Luckenbach's penthouse?

"Twas their first date. Yvonne, who had on a blue plunging neckline dress, mentioned she was near-sighted.

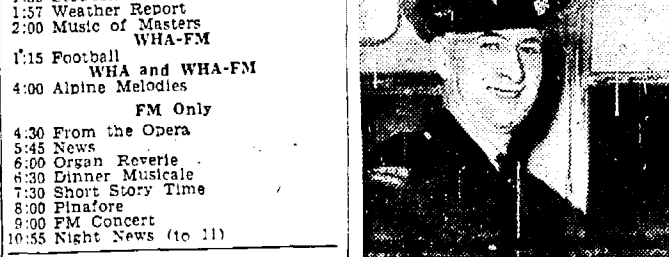
I was glad I wasn't. She said at the Venice Film festival, the photos tried to catch her with her glasses on, and did, and printed a picture.
