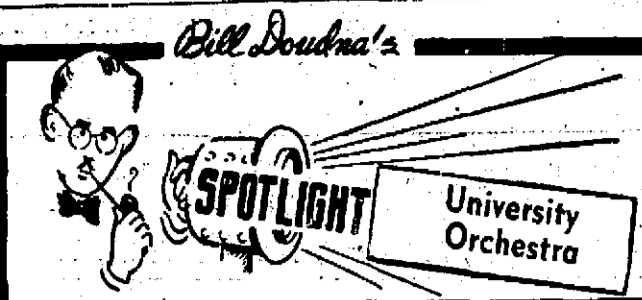

### TIP OF THE MORNING

One of the features of the University of Wisconsin Christmas festival on Dec. 5 will be the Wisconsin Harp choir, composed of seven university students.

Prof. Richard C. Church introduced the 1949-50 version of the University of Wisconsin Symphony orchestra to a turnaway audience.

Opening with a statement of the theme by the full orchestra, it turned to the orchestra's sections for reiterations with some changes in the melody. The variations which introduced each instrument fit them neatly, showing them off to advantage and retaining the spirit of the whole affair.

Steffens appeared in Beethoven's "Concerto No. 4," one of the most enjoyable of all that master's piano works—and one which was overshadowed for many years by the "Emperor" until Mendelssohn revived it.

Steffens played it with precision and vigor, but was never pedantic about it. The somber second movement, in which only the piano and strings appeared, was as dramatic a piece as you can find in so short a compass of time. The lively, happy, and sometimes humorous rondo was a joy to hear.

Church and his orchestra gave excellent support.

The concert opened with Mozart's "Haffner" symphony, played by the chamber orchestra. Pleasant and affable, typical of Mozart in its wealth of easy-to-listen-to melody, the work was a good introduction for the well-integrated chamber group.

After the concerto came two short pieces by William Walton, written for the film "Henry V." One was background for the death of Falstaff, the other a lyrical bit called "Touch Her Soft Lips and Part."

Hit of the afternoon for the audience was Benjamin Britten's "The Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra," in which Church was both conductor and narrator. Based on a theme by Henry Purcell, long regarded as England's greatest composer, it served not only to acquaint listeners with the individual instruments but also to explore Britten's versatile mind.

## Corn Borer Worst in State History, U. W. Man Reports

This was a good year for bugs. Corn borer was the worst it's ever been in Wisconsin, and several new insects showed in the state for the first time, E. H. Fisher, entomologist at the University of Wisconsin, reported today.

Corn borer helps spread stalk rot and weakens corn stalks, causing lodging, Fisher said. One borer per plant will cause a 3 per cent reduction in yield if corn is hand-picked, more if mechanical pickers are used.

Eight thousand acres of oats were treated for oat aphid in the northwestern part of the state. Web worm, tree aphids, box elder bugs, and other tree insects made their presence felt, but most were easily handled.

Cutworms appeared in many areas, Fisher said, and it took several different means of control to get them. Some cutworms feed below the ground and others above.

Many people report damage from termites, but most of the "termites" turned out to be powder post beetles, which literally turn posts into small holes and powder.

DDT and chlordan have successfully knocked out most household insects, with chlordan showing up a little better in the control of cockroaches and ants.
