Barbour Family to Be on Video

"One Man's Family," one of radio's oldest programs, will be on KSNB Fridays at 9 p. m. with Bert Lytell, noted stage and television star, playing the leading role of Father Barbour.

The program will be seen after the Friday telecast, on Sundays, starting Dec. 11.

Marjorie Gatenon, of Broadway, Hollywood and television, will portray Mother Barbour.

Arthur Cassell will play Jack; Billy Idelson will enact Cliff; Patricia Robbins, Hazel; Nancy Franklin, Claudia, and Russell Thorson, Paul.

Like its radio counterpart, the half-hour television version is written and produced by Carlton E. Morse. It is a saga of family life, treating with sympathetic humor the trials and tribulations of today's younger generation, their parents and grandparents.

"One Man's Family" was on the NBC network for more than 17 years, starting in San Francisco in April, 1932. Recipient of numerous awards and citations from magazines, newspapers and civic organizations, it placed first in the drama classifications of many polls during the years.

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What Broadway Folk Are Doing Told by Writer

NEW YORK. (AP) Margaret Phelan, the songstress, has a Cinderella foot. It is size 4 1/2, and the average size for a lady is 7.

Bumped into Arthur Schwartz, composer of "Inside U. S. A.," the television musical show, and he revealed that he and Howard Dietz have joined hands again. He spent thirty minutes telling me how he was incorporating some of his television sketches into the new stage revue he and Dietz are writing. I listened and then, remembering that Schwartz had been a lawyer before he began writing Broadway hits, I asked for some legal advice.

"That will demand a fee for legal services," he said. "You didn't pay me to tell you what I think of your show?" I retorted. "Then the best advice I can give you is to go to a legal lawyer," he said.

Billy Rose is transplanting his "Violins Over Broadway" musical at his Diamond Horseshoe rendezvous with a musical based on composer Stephen Foster. The "Violins" show had the longest run of any night club floor show in Broadway history, having persevered there for 23 months.

Dorothy Kirsten writes that she's returning from her Hollywood chores to do an opera which hasn't been staged at the Metropolitan Opera in 46 years. The blonde soprano, who has just finished a picture with Bing Crosby, is going to sing Puccini's "Manon Lescaut" in which Lucretia Bori and Beniamino Gigli starred in 1933.

Melvyn Douglas, who played a Washington statesman in his last appearance on Broadway, will be a night club maestro in his next play, "The Bird Cage." Walter Hampden, who was born in 1879, often speaks of retiring from the stage. But the more he becomes of it, the more active he becomes. A few months ago he was co-starring in "The Traitor" and now he is rehearsing to play opposite Grace George in the new comedy "Mother Hildebrand."

When Kate Smith received an honorary degree from John Marshall College the other day, the auditorium was so crowded that there were long lines of people who had to wait outside. The black robed dean turned to Kate and, in a dignified voice, said, "It looks like we have a packed house. Perhaps we ought to give them another show."

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Girl's Murder Is 'Big Story'

The murder of a 20-year-old Camden, N. J., girl and the work of Joseph Clarke, reporter for the Philadelphia Inquirer, provides the plot for "The Big Story" on KSNB Friday at 9:30 p. m.

When the girl's body was found by her father, a certified public accountant, it was believed she was the victim of a hit-and-run driver, but an autopsy revealed that she had been strangled, then hit with a blunt instrument.

Clarke's investigation of the case turned up amazing leads which brought one criminal to death in the electric chair and an accessory to a life term in prison.

William Quinn will portray Clarke in the telecast. Somer Alberg will be Paul Ringer, the girl's father; Ronny Liss will be Teddy, her brother; Bernard Hoffman will be Detective Leonard Hicky; Rich; Carl Dor will be Nicky Matti; a gangster, and Billy Green will be Sullivan, a friend of Clarke's.
