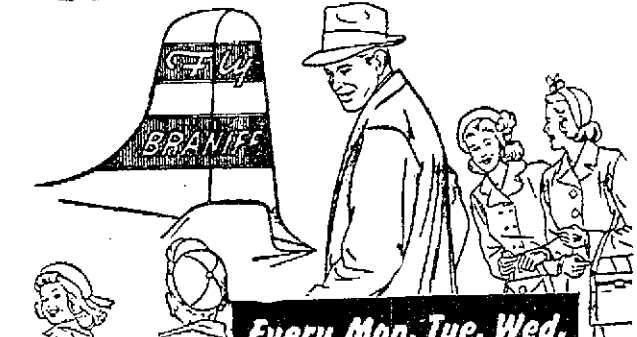

Winter Balm Lures Admah To California

Ken Carpenter became an announcer because of winter weather. On New Year's Day, 1928, Carpenter, who is announcer of KTSA-CBS' "Bing Crosby Program" and "Amos n' Andy," was sitting by his fireside in Peoria, Ill., listening to a Rose Bowl football game broadcast. The late Graham MacNamee's colorful description of California and its perfect weather intrigued Ken. An advertising man, he moved to California, got a job as an announcer. Subsequently, he won fame as a sportscaster. He had his face marked by cleats at a Rose Bowl game, nearly drowned on Navy Day, and was kicked by Azucar, winner of the first Santa Anita Handicap, in 1935. It was his description of that race that earned him his spot on the Crosby show.

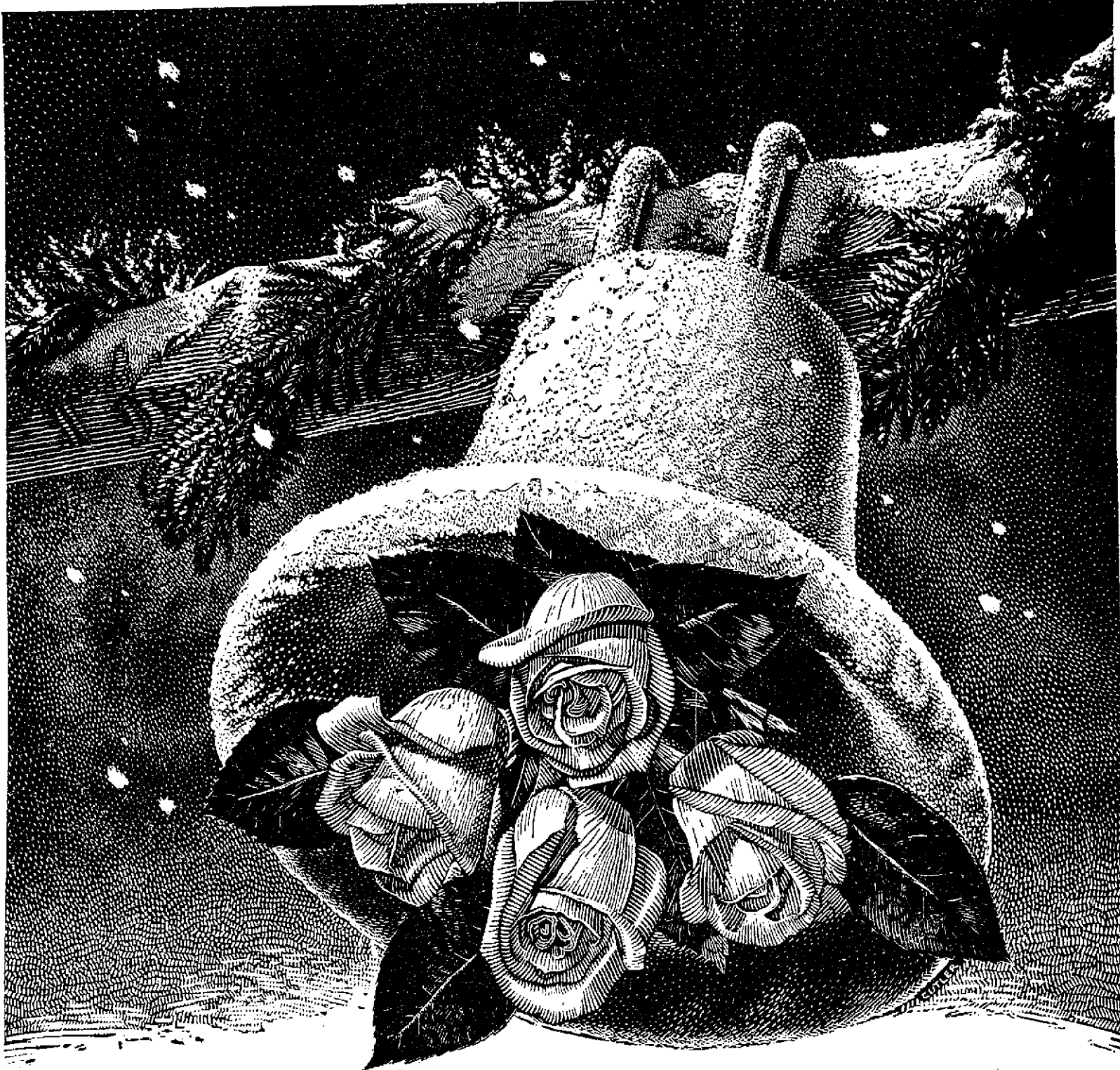

Color TV Said Year Away, Maybe Longer

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Ex- temporary sets available immediately. After the hearings are concluded, the commission will have to make a thorough study of the reams of data, set up standards for operation and the like. Involved is the matter of determining the system upon which these standards are to be based. Should the commission decide against making a pick, it might throw the whole matter back to the industry for a solution under a time limit. Then, after standards finally are set, more time will be required to make ready for public service operation.

This is based on the amount of time being required for the hearings of the Federal Communications Commission, for research and for testing. The present FCC sessions on color started Sept. 26 and since then 28 sittings have been held. Page after page of testimony has been offered in evidence along with tests of two projected systems, those of RCA and CBS. The hearings are now in recess until Feb. 6 for further tests in which equipment of Color Television, Inc., is scheduled for inclusion. Meantime, the FCC has asked the interested groups to let in the public on intensified field tests by making
