Demos to Launch '50 Drive Jan. 4

WASHINGTON. (AP) The Democratic National Committee has revealed plans for a nationwide radio program to launch the 1950 political campaign.

Chairman William H. Boyle Jr., called on party leaders to organize big "listening parties" in every town and city.

The coast-to-coast broadcast will be carried Jan. 4 by the American Broadcasting Co. It will include party big-wigs and rank and file voters speaking from various points around the country.

Boyle, Senate Democratic Leader Scott W. Lucas, Ill., and House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack, Mass., will open the half-hour program from Washington.

Burbank Station Ordered Off Air

WASHINGTON. (AP) The Federal Communications Commission has ordered radio station KWIK, of Burbank, off the air effective midnight, Jan. 8.

The commission said the station has been bankrupt since May. If the state files an appeal before Jan. 3, the commission will suspend its order until after a hearing has been held.

The commission also refused to assign the station's license to Leslie S. Bowden, trustee for the station.

"The commission... was asked to approve an assignment to a trustee even though it is admitted by petitioners that there may have been an illegal transfer of control of the license."

"This the commission can not do. The licensee of station KWIK was derelict in its duties to report changes in its stock holdings from the very beginning. There was one, if not two or more transfers of control of that license prior to the time the licensee became bankrupt."

"The commission can not approve a transfer which would in effect be a condonation of such past conduct."

Britain Will Ban Sadistic Themes

LONDON. (AP) The British Board of Films has sent an ultimatum to Hollywood-cut out sadism in films-or else.

"In a 'tough' film," said A. T. L. Watkins, secretary of the board, "one expects a lot of chin-bashing. But we draw the line at scenes of a man with hands tied behind his back being punched in the face and stomach."

Watkins said torture scenes were over-plentiful.

"We are determined to stop this unhealthy trend," he declared.

Watkins said the ultimatum has been sent to Joseph L. Breen, Hollywood studios' own censor under their production code, to pass along to U. S. film producers. Similar warnings went to British and European film makers.

From now on films with a "basically sadistic theme" will be banned outright in Britain. Watkins made no straight criticism of any particular film. He said the board is trying to stem what appears to be a trend.
