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SANTA ANITA PARK

THE BLIND MEN AND THE ELEPHANT

There is a very ancient fable about the three blind men who described an elephant. The one who examined his tail thought the elephant was a very different sort of beast from that described by the ones who examined his ears and trunk.

Thoroughbred racing, too, is many things to many people.

To most of us, racing, as it is conducted at Santa Anita Park, is a great and colorful sport that offers unsurpassed entertainment. Los Angeles Turf Club, Inc., realizes racing's primary function by offering prizes, including three \$100,000 handicaps and nine other \$50,000 features, which draw the greatest stables in the country, thus assuring the California public the utmost in sport.

To breeders, owners, trainers, jockeys grooms and more than 5000 persons employed at Santa Anita Park, racing is a great and important industry that affords them a livelihood. To California merchants racing is an attraction that brings millions of dollars into the State annually.

To farmers and others interested in agriculture, racing is the source from which the 78 State, county and citrus fairs of California derive virtually their entire support. There were only nine fairs in California when racing was legalized in 1933. Racina has paid vast revenue to the State in direct taxes, without which the 78 California fairs could not possibly exist.

To educators, racing has been the means of procuring material support and improvement for the University of California Agricultural College at Davis, the California Polytechnic School at San Luis Obispo and its citrus branch at San Dimas, as well as other State Colleges.

California sportsmen receive substantial sums of the racing revenue for wildlife preservation.

Each of the blind men described the elephant accurately according to his limited examination he had made, but because of his affliction, none could see the whole.

Californians, who are by no means blind, realize that racing has many different aspects, and that each of them is highly important.

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
