

Paintings by Arthur N. Colt, director of the Colt School of Art, have gone on display at the Madison Bank and Trust Co., which has used its walls for several years to exhibit the works of living American artists.

Colt has been a Madison resident since 1920, when he began teaching at the University of Wisconsin. Six years later, he opened his own school and studio. Through his painting and his classes here and in other Wisconsin cities, he has had an active influence on art throughout the state.

For nine years, Colt was superintendent of the art gallery at the Wisconsin State fair.

The works on display in the bank are "Portrait—Mrs. Ford," "Nashotah Mission," "Boats at Okeo," "Blue Mounds—In from Across the Fields," "Fishing Pier at Cornucopia," "Still Life," "Hillside Farm," "Portrait—Man," "Portrait—Lady With Scarf," "Portrait—Bonnie," and "Still Life."

Outside Judge to Hear Shawano Slaying Trial

SHAWANO—(UP)—An outside judge will be called in to preside at the murder trial of a 35-year-old Indian woman, it was decided here Tuesday. The decision was made when the attorney for Mary Boyd filed an affidavit of prejudice against Circuit Judge M. G. Eberlein. She is charged with the hatching of killing of her common law husband, Emil Schenk, last July. Her trial has been delayed because of her illness, but authorities hope to start it sometime this month. The Shawano county sheriff was told to call in a doctor to determine whether she is now able to stand trial.
