

Gilmer-Aiken legislation has clarified the powers of the state education agency and those of the local school districts, granting specific powers to the state and reserving all others to the individual school district. Greater initiative is thereby placed in the local school boards.

The state powers are consolidated in the Central Education Agency, which will exercise powers formerly held by several different boards.

First Elective Board

The new statutes provide for an elective State Board of Education of 21 members, one from each congressional district. Members elected last year will serve for two years. In the primary and general elections of 1952 seven members will be named for four-year terms and seven for six-year terms. Elections following the 1952 voting will be for six-year terms.

The State Board of Education was created as a policy-making, reviewing, and regulatory body with a single executive agentthe appointive Commissioner of Education. The Commissioner, named by the board for a fouryear term and confirmed by the
