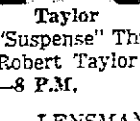

Twelfth Air Force Maintains Watch Over Reserve Program in Five States

The 12th Air Force, with headquarters at Brooks A.F.B. here, has devoted considerable effort to the Air Force reserve program. Air National Guard and Air Force ROTC programs in its five-state area during 1949. Commanded by Maj. Gen. Alden R. Crawford, the 12th is headquarters for Air Force reserve records of reservists in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. It has files on approximately 31,000 Air Force reserve officers and 30,000 airmen in the five-state area. Of that number, some 12,000 have begun active participation in the Air Force 1950 Reserve Training Program. In addition to the reserve program, the 12th supervises the training of 46 Air National Guard units which involves approximately 3,400 actively participating Air National Guardsmen. The 12th likewise supervises the Air Force ROTC program in its area and has the program in 16 colleges and universities in the five states. There are some 6,500 ROTC students enrolled at present and the number is expected to increase substantially at the beginning of the next semester. The 12th also has a low target squadron at Biggs Field, El Paso, composed of regular Air Force personnel who train and stay abreast with tow developments. There is a jet fighter wing at Albuquerque, N. M., which is in the process of converting from conventional type fighter aircraft to jet fighters. This wing, too, is composed of regular Air Force personnel and the conversion is being accomplished as rapidly as jet pilots can be trained. The 12th exercises control over and administers "off base" police authority in its five states over military personnel of the entire armed forces in the area.

Military Ball Of St. Mary's Set Friday

The Senior R.O.T.C. unit at St. Mary's University has elected Nancy Romero sweetheart of its third annual Military Ball to be held starting at 8:30 Friday at the Olmos Dinner Club.

The Military Ball, sponsored by the Cadet Officers' Club at St. Mary's, will be open to all St. Mary's students and their friends. It will be formal, with R.O.T.C. members and ex-servicemen wearing their uniforms. The coronation of Miss Romero, who is a student nurse at the Santa Rosa Nursing School, will be a feature of the dance. She will be escorted by Cadet First Lt. Robert Battaglia.

Duchesses in the sweetheart's court will be Barbara Richter, a student at Our Lady of the Lake College; Barbara Rick, Incarnate Word College student; Barbara Soule, assistant librarian at the San Antonio Public Library; and Ann Moulder, the sweetheart of last year's ball. Their escorts will include Cadet Maj. Alfred Sturchio, Cadet Capt. Wayne Glenn, and Cadet First Lt. Allen Angelus. Guest of honor at the St. Mary's affair will be Maj. Gen. Andrew Davis Bruce, deputy commander of the Fourth Army. Music will be furnished by Al Sturchio and his orchestra.

North Side School Election Slated

The North Side Consolidated Common School District No. 1 will have an election on Saturday with voting booths at the following schools: Leon Springs, Leon Valley, Helotes, Lock Hill and Mackey. The polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

The propositions to be voted on are: (1) to set the tax rate, (2) the assumption of bonds, and (3) to vote bonds totaling \$90,000 for the construction of a new school building at Mackey, to repair and make necessary additions to elementary schools, and to supplement funds for the construction of the high school.

Income Tax Reports Due From Some Groups Soon

Farmers, businessmen and other tax payers of the San Antonio district have been warned by Division Chief R. K. Peters, collector's office of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, that Jan. 16 is the deadline for making timely final payments on or amending 1949 declarations of estimated tax. Under the law, the due date will be Jan. 15, but since that date falls on Sunday this year, payments, declarations and final returns may be made on Monday, Peters said. A new law permits farmers to dispense with filing or making payments on a declaration of estimated tax if they file and pay in full their final returns for 1949 not later than Jan. 31, he declared. If a farmer does not expect to file his return by that time, he must file and make payment on a declaration by Jan. 15 and then can take until March 15 to file his final return. Peters said business and professional people, investors and others subject to filing declarations, amended declarations or making payment by Jan. 15, may also substitute their final returns but must do so by Jan. 16. Generally speaking, he said, wage earners are not involved in the Jan. 15 filing date, because under the pay-as-you-go system their taxes are substantially paid in advance by the withholding of income tax from their wages. In order to provide a pay-as-you-go method for other taxpayers, according to Peters, the law requires a declaration of estimated tax from any person who in a year expects to have more than \$100 of income outside of wages from which tax is withheld, and gross income of \$600 or more. It also affects any person whose expected wages (even though subject to withholding) exceed \$4,500 plus \$600 for each exemption to which he is entitled. Except for farmers, Peters stated, these declarations are due by March 15 of the same year in which the income is ex-
