'Star Dust' Composer Is 'Going Symphonic'

Hoagy made his debut last month as a composer 'on the serious side.' His tone poem, 'Brown County in Autumn' was premiered by the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra. Well, it was nice having you down on our level, Hoagy. Happy cadenza!

Accolade: It is interesting to note that three forthcoming performers with the San Antonio Symphony started in one event in New York a couple of weeks ago... and all received 'rave' notices. They are Astrid Varnay, Dimitri Mitropoulos and Elena Nikolaidi. The event, Richard Strauss' opera 'Elektra,' presented by the New York Philharmonic Symphony. Top critics strained their typewriter keys in beating out the praises of Mitropoulos as conductor. Varnay the soprano and Nikolaidi the contralto... particularly Olin Downes of the New York Times and Newsweek Magazine's critic.

Famous Radio and recording stars, including Hank Williams, Little Jimmy Dickens, Bill Monroe are featured in this star-studded N.B.C. Radio show from Nashville, Tenn., Gastring said. Other popular members of the cast include Lew Childre, The Man from Alabama; the comedy team Lonzo & Oscar, String Bean the Kentucky Wonder, The Blue Grass Quartet, Shenandoah Valley Trio.

Hank Williams' famous recording of 'Love-Sick Blues' has placed him among the top cowboy ballad singers of the nation. Bill Monroe is known to all lovers of hill-billy and cowboy music with recordings such as 'Kentucky Waltz' and 'Footprints in the Snow.'

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL ENROLLMENT JUMPS

Reports of principals of elementary schools to Miss Inez Foster, assistant superintendent for the elementary division, indicate an increased enrollment of nearly 900 students since school was resumed after the Christmas holidays. The peak enrollment in the school system is usually met about the first of March. Schools which were operating at or near capacity last year have felt some pressure because of this increase, which is brought about chiefly by the return of migratory workers to the city. School officials say these workers usually begin returning early in December. Because of the short period before students are dismissed for the Christmas holidays, very few of these pupils enroll in school during December. The rush develops on the resumption of school in January. Since many of these migratory workers move into suburban residential areas, the preponderance of enrollment is felt in the suburban school districts.
