Capital Folk to See, Give Views on Video in Color

WASHINGTON, (AP) Columbia Broadcasting System will ask public audiences for opinions and criticisms on its color television. The first public showing of any system is being set up here by CBS which announced today it would request each person viewing the demonstration to fill out a brief questionnaire. The questionnaires will be turned over to the Federal Communications Commission as a possible aid in deciding whether color is now ripe for general commercial use. Starting tomorrow, CBS will show publicly its color system on the ground floor of a downtown office building. There will be two half-hour shows daily for the remainder of the month. Each of those attending the showings, on eight large receivers, will be asked initially: "Which do you think is more enjoyable, color or black and white television?" The other questions deal with reactions to overall quality, brightness, clearness and truthfulness of detail. In addition, the viewer will be asked if he observed any defects and, if so, to describe them, along with a notation on his viewing position. The answers will be tabbed as to age, sex, education and television-set ownership. The Columbia show is preliminary to a resumption of FCC hearings on the color question late next month, when the commission will have a competitive demonstration of rival color systems proposed by CBS, Radio Corporation of America and Col-
