Texas December Retail Sales Exceed November 22 Per Cent

Texas retail sales rose 22 per cent in December from November to an estimated \$551,873,000, a 1 per cent gain over December 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Sales in durable goods stores increased 2 per cent in December from November and 3 per cent from December 1948.

Jewelry stores turned in the largest November-to-December increase in durable goods sales—189 per cent; furniture and household goods dealers reported a 27 per cent increase. Automotive store sales dropped 8 per cent from the previous month, while building material, lumber, and hardware slipped 7 per cent.

In comparison with December 1948 durable goods sales, jewelry store sales slid 16 per cent, while sales of building material, lumber, and hardware decreased fractionally. Automotive sales rose 14 per cent, and furniture and household goods sales showed a fractional increase.

Total non-durable goods sales rose 40 per cent in December from November, but showed only a fractional increase over December 1948.

All stores in the non-durable goods group reported November-to-December sales increases. Florist sales rose 77 per cent; department store sales, 72 per cent; general merchandise stores, 47 per cent; drug stores, 38 per cent; office, store and school supply stores, 20 per cent; country general stores, 19 per cent; food stores, 14 per cent; and eating and drinking places, 1 per cent.

DEPOT SAFETY GADGET WINS CASH FOR WORKER

For aiding in making better working conditions at the San Antonio General Depot, Elbert W. Boultinghouse, was awarded a check for \$57.50.

Boultinghouse, who lives on Hwy. 281 South, is a general mechanic in the depot's Signal Supply Section. His suggestion, which paid off in cash, concerned a better method of mixing distilled water and sulfuric acid for use as battery electrolyte.

The old system of mixing the battery acid was a laborious task which involved much time in stirring the mixture with a wooden paddle as a little acid at a time was added to water. As the strong acid was poured into the water a great deal of heat and fumes was generated making undesirable working conditions. There was also the possibility of spilled acid on clothing and hands.

Boultinghouse had an idea. He obtained a piece of one-half inch lead tubing and bent it to fit the bottom of the mixing crock. Holes were drilled in the tubing, and the tube was fastened to an air line.

With the tubing resting on the bottom of the crock, and the air pressure turned on, the liquid is gently agitated by escaping air which further acts to cool the fluid.

With this new system, depot officials point out, it is unnecessary for a man to stand by the crock during the mixing since it is practically automatic except for the occasional adding of acid.

Gain Recorded In Poll Taxes

Poll tax paying, which has been lagging behind last year's record up until this week, built up a 3,000 lead Wednesday, Collector P. E. Dickison reported.

He predicted that by next Tuesday—the last day for the paying of poll tax to qualify for the ballot—the lead will be not less than 8,000.

If this prediction is realized, poll tax receipts will total about 94,000 this year. Exemptions are not included in this figure.

Dickison took occasion again to quote the cost of poll tax receipts. Regardless of other published figures, he said the price is \$1.75 for one and \$3.50 for two (a man and wife paying together).

He was manager and owner of several shops at Schofield Barracks. Survivors are his widow, Mrs. Catherine Gibbons Miller, formerly of San Antonio; and a daughter, Douglas, Ariz.

Reserve Group Cites Prospects For Promotion

Vacancies in the 21st Air Force Service Command (Reserve) give promise of promotion possibilities to qualified officers, declares Brig. Gen. Russell I. Oppenheim, commander of the Kelly A.F.B. reserve unit.

Many positions are open, the general said, which will be filled with new officers who meet the qualifications. In most instances, he explained, the authorized rank for the position is such that it will provide good opportunity in the case of younger officers.

The 21st is a reserve organization attached to Kelly for training. Its wartime mission is to establish and direct all supply activities in a theater of operations. This puts the 21st on a par with the Air Materiel Command at Wright-Patterson A.F.B., Ohio, Gen. Oppenheim added.
