Former Newsmen Plays May Hit Broadway Stage

NEW YORK, (AP) A survey of prospective Broadway shows which will have their tryouts in the summer theater circuit beginning in May reveals an unusually large number from the pens of newspapermen. Perhaps it may be explained by the bountiful number of books which were written by war correspondents during World War II and which were afterwards turned into successful stage, screen and radio plays.

Now the trend seems to be that newspapermen, in addition to their regular tasks, are moving toward the theater in abundance. They have a good and ample springboard to back up this judgment. In selecting the 20 most show-wise craftsmen on the Broadway stage today, I certainly would include George S. Kaufman, Russell Crouse and Maxwell Anderson. All three are former newspapermen. It should be noted in particular that these three not only moved from the copy desks to writing hit plays. But all three, like the good reporters they are, probed this new craft of show business as they would into a news story. They became not only playwrights of hits, but also producers, directors and managers in one of the greatest gambles of arts. They studied and became masters of every corner of the theater.

That is why I await the musical comedy, "Guys and Dolls," scheduled to open on Broadway in February or March. Based upon the guys and dolls and molls of Broadway, the ones that differ Blondes."

Hammerstein Tells How to Get Music Published

NEW YORK. An amateur with one real song in his heart has more chance of getting it published than the man with 40 superficial ditties in his trunk. So says Oscar Hammerstein II in his book "Lyrics" (Simon and Schuster) containing 71 of his own favorite song lyrics over the past quarter century (he has written around a thousand). "Technique and professional polish do not make a song," he says. "They improve it and their absence might ruin it, but there is an element much less tangible that is the deciding factor in a song's life. "One evening this summer I was on Arthur Godfrey's television program. He told me that he was continually besieged by young songwriters. He said that almost everyone seemed to have a diamond trick, six heart tricks and a diamond trick. He never used his ace of clubs. "While the finesse plays a very important part in most bridge hands, too many players lose contracts that might otherwise be made by taking an unnecessary finesse. Take time to figure out the different angles and percentage plays of a hand and give yourself the benefit of every possibility in a hand.
