Saint-Saens' musical comic book, "The Carnival of Animals," which once caused lifted eyebrows, was a lot of fun for everybody at the 24th season.

Gunnar Johansen and Leo Steffens, duo-pianists, and a chamber orchestra directed by Walter Heermann played the group of descriptive pieces with alternate grace and frolicking.

The pianists made an admirable team, as they showed more certainly in their first group—a reverent playing of "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring" and a resonant, full-bodied performance of Saint-Saens' "Variations on a Theme by Beethoven. Both men, Madison knows well, are virtuosos in their own respective rights, and their team-work is equally good.

The Madison Civic chorus, too, did well with Bach, singing three choruses from "Cantata No. 140," with skill and balance. The last "Gloria Sing All Your Voices," on which "A Mighty Fortress" was based, was an especially good example of choral singing.

Another fine piece of work was Schubert's "The Omnipotence," in which Corinne Branley sang the incidental soprano solo, as was the somewhat showy "O Sing Ye Sons" by Noble Cain.

The Mozart club, directed by Ralph James contributed Frank's "Psalm 150," Csini's "Roll, Charlot, Roll," and a spiritual, "De Animals-a-Coming," plus its theme as an encore. It was best in the rollicking spiritual.

A bow goes, as well, to the orchestra, especially for its work in "The Carnival of Animals," with the clucking hens, the ponderous elephants, the clattering fossils,

the graceful swan, and the shimmering goldfish it described. The next civic concert is scheduled for Sunday night, Feb. 19, when Jenksa Siebos, cellist, will be soloist with the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra.

Russia Reported Asking Sub Bases in China, Korea

TOKYO (UP)—Russia is negotiating for submarine bases in China and in Communist-dominated northern Korea, reports to American and Japanese sources said Sunday.

Russia already is basing submarines in southern Sakhalin island, taken from Japan after the war, as well as at Dairen, Manchuria, and Vladivostok on the Soviet far eastern coast, the reports said.

Reports reaching here, most of them brought by repatriated Japanese war prisoners, say that Russia probably has only about 18 submarines in active service now, on winter patrol, in western Pacific waters. The reports add, however, that the fleet is to be built up.

The reports generally agree that Russia is probably building her submarines for Pacific service at factories in inland Siberia.

The submarine parts are sent to far eastern ports via the trans-Siberian railroad, the reports say, and then assembled at Vladivostok.
