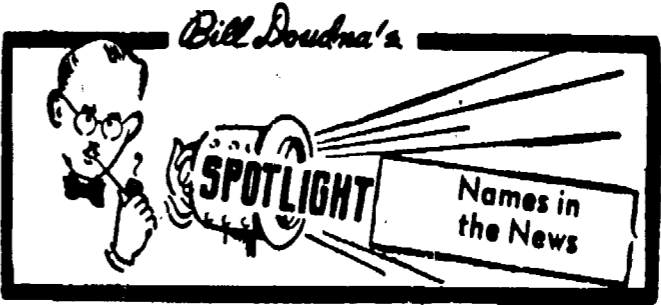

ST. OLAF CHOIR: The stimulating music of the St. Olaf Lutheran choir attracted about 1,800 listeners to Bethel Lutheran church Friday, when the young singers gave two concerts.

Olaf C. Christiansen, son of the founder, conducted the ensemble in a program replete with youthful enthusiasm and mature musicianship. In the back row stood Paul G. Schmidt, who for 47 years was the choir's manager and whose son, Frederick A., now holds that post. Besides this, the elder Schmidt is an uncle of the Rev. F. I. Schmidt, Bethel's pastor.

For the first time in this reviewer's memory, the choir used the same soloist throughout. Christiansen had good reason for the decision—the bright and vibrant soprano voice of Winifred Alberg, who lives in Northfield, Minn., the home of the choir and the college it represents.

Miss Alberg sang the solos in "Joy of being Christians."
 Such happiness in holy songs was often the choir's own reaction. "Lost in the Night," arranged by F. Mellus Christiansen, the choir's founder; his "Lullaby on Christmas Eve" and "The Christmas Symbol," and the ever-loved "Beautiful Savior."

The choir maintained the musical stature which the Christiansens have given it, with a tonal beauty that few such groups equal, a keen attention to detail without the intensity which can make such attention produce mechanical music, and clean intonation.

Psychiatrist for State Calls Carol 'Sane'

BRIDGEPORT, Conn.—UPI—A psychiatrist testified Friday that Carol Paignt, 21, knew exactly what she was doing when she killed her cancer-ridden father.

He said she later suffered from a type of amnesia which causes forgetfulness of painful incidents.

Dr. Joseph M. Lesko, a Bridgeport neuro-psychiatrist, was called by the prosecution to refute testimony of a defense doctor that the tall, blonde girl was insane when she shot Police Sgt. Carl W. Paignt, her father, in a Stamford, Conn., hospital.

Spectators Warned
 There was an outbreak among the spectators in the packed courtroom, most of them sympathetic toward Carol over her "mercy killing," when Lesko testified under cross-examination that he was being paid by the state for his testimony.

Judge John A. Cornell pounded for order and warned that he would clear the courtroom if there was any further demonstration.

The state rested its case Friday. The defense had rested Thursday. Judge Cornell said final arguments would be given Tuesday and the case was expected to go to the jury of nine men and three women, all parents of older children, that afternoon.

Carol has pleaded innocent to a second degree murder charge on which she faces possible life imprisonment.

Her defense is based on the claim that she was temporarily insane the night of Sept. 23, when she put a bullet through Paignt's brain with his own .38 caliber service revolver. She testified Thursday that she still can't remember what happened.

Prosecutor Lorin W. Willis called Lesko to the stand as his star rebuttal witness. He asked Lesko, a paunchy man with heavy hornrimmed glasses, whether Carol was sane on the night of Sept. 23.

"She was sane," Lesko replied. Lesko added that when he saw Carol for the first time in her hospital room the day after the slaying she was suffering from amnesia.

He described it as "genuine amnesia," an amnesia "enlarged by repression." It is, he said, "the forgetting of painful or shameful or unpleasant experiences."

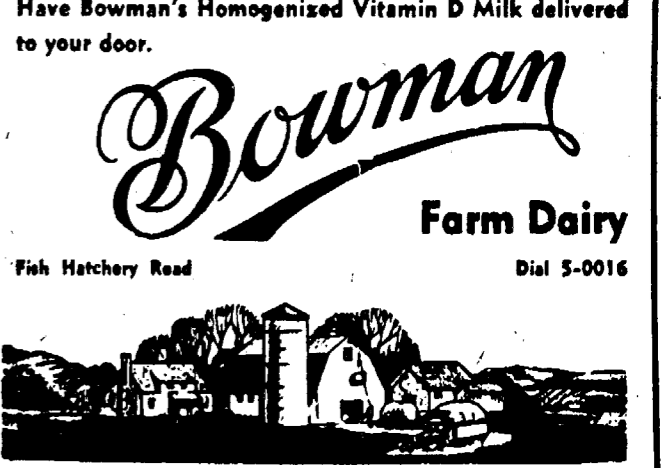
