(State Journal Radio Editor)
"Fluff" is radio slang for a slip of the tongue or the accidental misreading of a line, or some such error.

These are forgiveable sins, for which the sinner is immediately repentant.
Radio lore records dozens of them, some authentic and some legendary. Among the fun-

niest, and least likely to be true, are those lines spoken by someone who thought his microphone was not operatingbut was.

Of these, the most commonly heard is the one about the announcer on a children's show who turned from the mike and said, "There, that'll hold the little for a

This one has been debunked so often that it would seem silly to repeat it here, except that plenty of people still think it's true.

Sometimes you can't help yourself when

you're on the air. Recently, a reader tells me, a Madison minister spoke twice within a few moments of "prespiration"—meaning, of course, "perspiration" I had a similar experience, pro-nouncing "circuit" like this: "sir-kute." I knew was wrong, so I repeated it. And it came out the same way. A third try produced the same sound, so I gave up.

But it is not easy to forgive mispronunciations which are obviously the result of mere carelessness. Every studio should have a list of frequently-mispronounced names (I know that WIBA has one) available to announcers. More important, these gentlemen should study the

Many geographical names are pronounced differently when they refer to different places. Coming to mind at once are Gotham, Berlin, Valparaiso, Cairo, and Vienna.

Then there are the homespun philosophers who pretend to know something about every-thing, and who mangle grammar, sometimes to achieve the homespun effect but often, one may guess, through sheer ignorance.

Residents Crowd Tiny Malta

If you visit Malta, you will find that-many persons on the island can speak English. The natives of Malta learn English in school, They may speak Italian as well, but in their homes they are likely to use the language called "Maltese."

Malta is one of the most thickly settled islands in the world. It has an average of more than 2,500 person to the square mile

The Island of Hongkong, off the coast of China, and Manhattan island, a part of New York City, have far more persons than that to the square mile, but most other islands of the world are not nearly so thickly settled.

One reason for Malta's having so many people is its soil. The soil is so rich that almost any kind of plant will grow in it. Along with excellent soil, the island has a good supply of rainfall, making crops easy to raise.


The Maltese dog is a small animal with long hair. The hair is white and silky.
