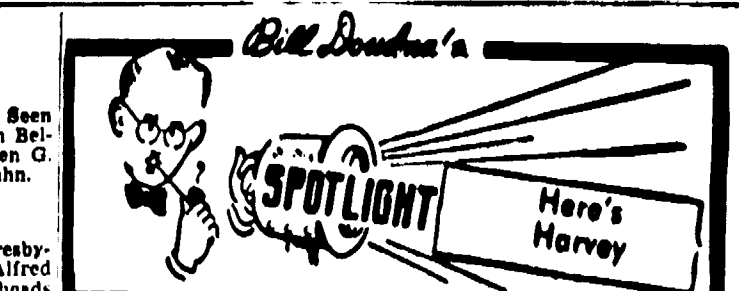

City Seeks \$27,328 in Taxes Allotted to Other Districts

The city has filed 50 claims with the state department of taxation for 1948 and 1949 income taxes totaling \$27,328 erroneously allotted to 31 other taxing districts, Finance Director George Forster reported Friday afternoon.

The biggest claims are \$6,697.66 and \$4,663.13 against the village of Maple Bluff; \$1,647.68 and \$1,944.12 against the town of Middleton; \$797.60 and \$2,454.53 against the town of Madison; \$1,738.95 and \$808.40 against the town of Westport.

City Accepts AAA Parking Aid Offer

The services of a traffic engineer to help Madison solve its offstreet traffic problem offered free of charge Tuesday by the Wisconsin division of the American Automobile Assn. (AAA) were accepted late Friday.

Laverne Johnson, Washington, D. C., national AAA traffic engineering and safety department member, will arrive in Madison Feb. 20, Stuart B. Wright, Wisconsin AAA general manager who made the offer to the city council, announced.

Wright said it is expected that Johnson will be in Madison for several days to study the parking problem before making recommendations to the parking utility and city council.

Blooming Grove Again Opposes Annexation Move

For a second time within three years, the town of Blooming Grove intervened Friday in opposition to a movement for annexation of town territory to the city of Madison.

William F. Dettinger, town chairman, filed petitions with City Clerk A. W. Baretz, signed by 108 electors in a proposed 165-acre annexation area east of the city limits, "rescinding their previous signatures on a petition for annexation."

An ordinance annexing the plats between Highway 30, Starkweather creek, Sun Prairie road and Rethek and Worthington aves., is in the 30-day legal publication stage, and was scheduled for action by the city council Feb. 24.

The town intervened similarly two years ago to block the annexation of five plats farther east.

The new "rescinding" petition recites that the signers have "reconsidered the advantages and disadvantages of annexation" and are now opposed, and informs the city council that the withdrawals are "mandatory and not discretionary."

The signatures and valuations represented in the withdrawal petition have not been checked fully against the original petition, but undoubtedly are sufficient to wipe out the annexation majority, Frank W. Harrison, investigator in the office of City Atty. Harold E. Hanson, reported Friday afternoon.

Art Firm Awarded \$1,500 on Debt Claim

The Screen Art Co., 737 E. Dayton st., was awarded \$1,500 in circuit court Friday in settlement of a debt collection suit started against Asst. Prof. Anne K. Foote, 2909 Columbia rd., art director of the Wisconsin Union, and Elaine Smedal, Milwaukee.

Foote claimed the two women owed \$2,109 of a \$4,332 bill for 4,750 sets of illustrations printed in March, 1948, for a book entitled "Decorative Art in Wisconsin."

Circuit Judge Alvin C. Reis approved the settlement.

U.W. Enrolment Drops on Campus, at Centers

The University of Wisconsin's student enrolment has dropped this semester on the Madison campus and at extension centers, Registrar Kenneth Little said Friday.

The final spring semester enrolment at Madison is 16,263, 1,400 below last fall. The university now has 2,000 fewer student veterans than last autumn, Little said.

At extension centers, enrolment is down 10 per cent. Some 1,400 students have registered at the Milwaukee center and 1,200 at the others.

What an Operation Story She's Got to Tell

GREEN BAY—(P)—Mrs. Cui Smith almost died 16 years ago when doctors at Oskaloosa, Ia., operated on her for a ruptured appendix.

Complications developed two weeks later and a second operation was necessary.

Thursday Mrs. Smith was operated on again, this time for adhesions resulting from the original operation.

Her physician, Dr. Milton Kuhs, found a healthy appendix still intact.

Said Dr. Kuhs, "I won't speculate on what the Oskaloosa surgeon removed 16 years ago."

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
