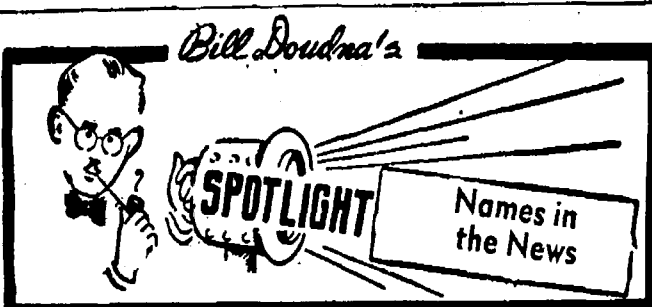


The Orbits

Billy Redfield, 22-year-old veteran of radio and stage, replaces Eddie Albert this week in the leading male role of "Miss Liberty" on Broadway.

Bob Hope will do a two-week vaudeville appearance at New York's Paramount for \$50,000 a week.

Ralph Bellamy will not star in the film version of "Detective Story" because stage and television commitments will prevent his going to Hollywood.

Julie and Juliette Gerke will play two-piano music Wednesday night in Milwaukee, appearing at the 20th anniversary banquet of the Evangelical Lutheran Men's club.

Humphrey Bogart's transcription series will hit the air shortly.

Bing Crosby has been asked by the state department to make personal appearances in Japan.
