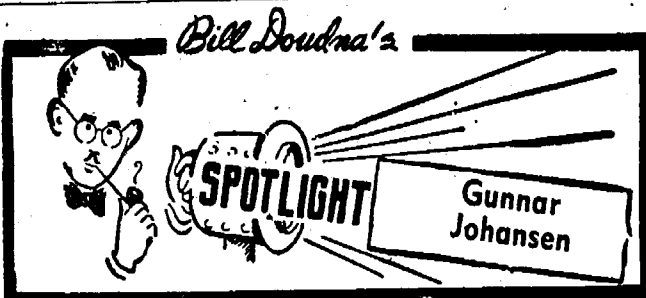

TIP O' THE MORNING: Because of Albert Rahier's illness, the first concert in the University of Wisconsin Schoenberg series will be shorter than planned.

The flashing fingers and sensitive spirit of Gunnar Johansen combined to make an intriguing program at the Wisconsin Union theater Sunday afternoon.

Sunday afternoon, when an audience of about 1,000 gathered to hear the University of Wisconsin pianist. The concert was the 236th Sunday Music hour sponsored by the Wisconsin Union music committee.

Johansen opened the afternoon with a chaste performance of Bach's 'Tocatta in D Major,' so clear and definitive that one thought at once of a harpsichord to which had been added a touch of the piano's warmth.

The same clarity—a typical Johansen attribute—permeated the first two movements of Beethoven's 'Sonata in A Flat Major.'

The pianist went completely dramatic in the third section, the funeral march, thereby adding a sense of heaviness to the playing.

After a flamboyant playing of Schumann's 'Etudes Symphoniques' which somehow didn't sound like Johansen at all, the pianist delivered a brilliant performance of Liszt's six Paganini caprices, with flying fingers tracing lively melodies at one time, and with virile hands sounding crashing chords at another.

The next Sunday Music hour, Mar. 19, will bring the University Symphony orchestra to the theater with Prof. Richard C. Church conducting.

Businessmen Urge Colleges, Charities, Co-Ops Be Taxed

WASHINGTON (UP)—A business group suggested Sunday that the treasury could add more than \$1,000,000,000 a year to its revenues by taxing the business incomes of colleges, cooperatives, and so-called charitable institutions.

The National Associated Businessmen, Inc., said its representatives will present the suggestion to the house ways and means committee next Wednesday.

The organization said its stand will be supported the same day by spokesmen for the National Retail Hardware Assn., Grain and Feed Dealers National Assn., National Tax Equality Assn., and other trade groups.

The NAB said the tax-exempt colleges, co-operatives, and charitable institutions own \$157,000,000,000 of the national wealth—more than a third of the total, and that they do nearly \$75,000,000,000 of business each year.

It asserted that \$624,334,000 in taxes could be collected from co-ops, building and loan associations, mutual savings banks, post exchanges, and mutual insurance groups.

Another \$12,333,000, it added, could be provided by labor unions, farm and business associations, and social clubs.
