Suit-directing Play Shown in This Demonstration Hand

BY WILLIAM E. MCKINNEY could not afford to play the king on the first trick, as that might be giving up a sure trick. East must now try to reason out why West played the queen knowing that West also held the 10. In the suit-directing convention when Harry Fishbein, one of the owners of the Mayfair Bridge Club in New York City said: "I have the most dramatic situation of the suit-directing play you have ever seen?" So between us we built up today's hand. You may not approve of the bidding, but to create this situation we could not allow West to bid spades. That would have spoiled our whole story. After we had finished the hand we let the spectators see only the North and East hands, so I suggest that you cover up the South and West hands. The opening lead of the 10 of clubs is won by East with the ace. East cashes the ace of hearts, South plays the king and West the queen. Now what should East shift to? If you have not looked at the South and West hands, I am sure most of you will have East continue with a heart, but he should not. 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Lone N. Y. Zither Player Popular as Craze Spreads

By MARK BARRON NEW YORK. Tin Pan Alley musicians are, as they express it in the saxophone and cymbal area, in a dither over the zither. And a thorough search revealed the other day there is only one professional zither player in New York, a fellow named Franz Dietzschmann. It just isn't Broadway that's in a dither. An Associated Press dispatch from London last November reported that Princess Margaret and Sharmar Douglas, daughter of the U. S. ambassador, showed up at the Empress night club three hours before opening time. They wanted to ask Anton Karas, Viennese zither player and composer, to play the zither score he did for the background music of the forthcoming picture, "The Third Man." He played it for them six times. Returning travelers have been asking for this zither theme after listening to it in showings of "The Third Man" in London, but this music is restricted in the United States until the time of the national release of the picture, approximately April 1. So the Tin Pan Alley went to work in a hurry and the composers turned out a zither opus called "The Zither Serenade." Then Frank B. Walker, managing director of M.G.M. records, looked at the zither recordings he had made of "The Third Man Theme" and "Cafe Mozart Waltz" and realized that he could not release them until April 1 or afterwards. So he took "The Zither Serenade" and went looking for a zither player in New York.
