Color TV Tests Now in Progress

LAUREL, Md. (AP) The Federal Communications Commission came to this race-track town to see a new kind of sweepstakes—a race involving three major proponents of color television.

There is no connection between horses and color video. It just happened that the FCC has its testing and experimental laboratories here.

The Radio Corporation of America, the Columbia Broadcasting System, and Color Television, Inc. of San Francisco, were asked to make first comparative demonstrations of their color video systems for the commission's benefit.

C. B. S. and R. C. A. already have shown their systems in single and joint demonstrations. But C. T. I., the dark horse from the west coast, was not ready to show its system until it had been tested by the commission at tests in a Washington hotel last Monday and white, or monochrome ray.

The FCC is trying to find out whether any one of the three systems technically is advanced to the point where the American public can be told that color television is ready now. Some industry officials say color TV is ready now. But other experts believe several more years are needed before it can match black and white, or monochrome ray.

Hollywood Picture Crew in Philippines

MANILA, (AP) Nine Twentieth Century-Fox technicians arrived from Hollywood to prepare for filming "An American Guerrilla in the Philippines."

Director Fritz Lang, who arrived a week ago with other technicians, has been looking for location sites. He took a look at Bataan from a plane after authorities warned him against entering the peninsula where government forces are fighting Communist-led guerrillas and outlaw bands.

Tyrone Power, who will star in the picture, is expected here in about three weeks.

Cross-ruff Good Strategy, if Done at Proper Time

The other day I found a hand-did declarer would over-ruff with which had been played by Col. Richard H. Skinner of Alexandria, Va., who was president of the American Contract Bridge League in 1944.

There is an old saying that many a man is walking the streets of London because he failed to lead trump. Skinner proved that is not always true in today's hand. He cross-ruffed the hand and I think he timed it very well.

The opening lead of the eight of diamonds was won by Skinner (sitting South) with the king when East correctly refused to play the ace, which would have established two diamond tricks for declarer.

The ace and king of clubs were then cashed by declarer, and on

the king dummy's seven of diamonds was discarded. The nine of hearts was led and won with the queen in dummy. The king of hearts was cashed and Skinner discarded his three of spades and Skinner over-ruffed with the five-spot.

The three of clubs was led and ruffed in dummy with the deuce of spades. The three of hearts came back and when East refused to ruff, declarer won the trick with the six of spades. He now gave up a diamond trick, throwing East in the lead. East decided to try to stop some of the cross-ruffing, so he led the king of spades, which declarer won with the ace.

Now the nine of clubs was trumped in dummy with the ten of spades. East still refused to make two spade tricks, refusing to over-ruff. The six of hearts was led from dummy and now East was helpless. If he trumped with the queen, it would establish declarer's jack of spades. If he trumped with the nine-spot, as he

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
