### Louisiana Story' Plays Brilliantly

(State Journal Music Editor)
The contemporary section of the record libraries gets a boost from Columbia's issuance of Virgil Thomson's "Louisiana Story" paired on a 10-inch long-play-

ing disc with his "Five Portraits." The latter has been available on 78-rpm records. The Philadelphia orchestra performs both works, with Thomson conducting the "Por-

traits" and Eugene Ormandy directing "Louisiana Story." The latter was composed for a motion picture, and stands up alone better than most such

music. The first-rate performance is admirably recorded. It brings cut vividly such things as the landscape of the Cajun country and the boy's adventures with his pet rac-

Villa-Lobos' "Uirapuru," a vivid tone poem based on a Brazilian Indian legend, and the score for "Les Sylphides" occupy a 12-inch longthe New York Philharmonic-Symphony orchestra under Efrem Kurtz. Again, the performance and the mechanics of recording are topnotch.

A collection of French songs sung by Martial Singher fills both sides of a third 12-inch long-playing record. The baritone makes even the trite one sound good. And the accompanity of the control o ments, by Paul Ulanowsky and John LaMontaine, planists; Ross Norwood, flutist, and Marcel Hubert, cellist, are above par. Among the songs are the sentimental "Elegy" of Massenet, the sparkling "Villanelle of the Little Ducks," by Chabried, Faure's "The Palms," Gounod's 'Serenade," and others.

In the piano section, there's a pairing of Dohananyi's "Suite en Valse," with the same composer's transcriptions of Delibes "Naila" waltz and Schubert's "Valse Nobles." The suite is played by Dohnanyi and Edward Kilenyi, the transcriptions by Kilenyi. The former has little to recommend it, aside from good reproduction, but Kilenyi plays the excellent transcriptions with a good deal of brilliance.

They usually make the walls of their

homes out of clay. Most families in Ethiopia have houses with from one to four rooms. A framework of wood is set up and sticks and poles are fastened together. Then men trample straw or chopped grass into a bed of moist clay, making what the na-tives call "chicka." The chicka is placed around the framework to produce walls which are from six to two feet thick.

Many of the roofs are thatched. Others are made of metal. The floor is likely to be simply the ground, covered with mats.

There are windows and doors in Ethiopia which "never close tight," and sometimes the inside walls are covered with wall paper. Well-to-do families have floors

made from wooden planks. In Addis Ababa and some smaller towns. lumber is costly because it must be brought from a distance.



Those are native products, busome families own tables, chairs and beds obtained through trade with Europeans.
