'End Play' Valuable Asset of Expert Card Players

By WILLIAM E. MCKENNEY. The end play is one of the most valuable assets of the expert card player, a fact well demonstrated in the recent championship tournaments held in New York. This series of championship events was restricted to the finest players in the world, so I know you can improve your bridge by learning some of the plays they used in those tournaments. The world championship masters individual tournament for the Albert and Philip Steiner Trophy was won by Morrie Elis of New York for the second time. This year there were 56 players in the event, and after five sessions of grueling play, Elis came out on top, as he had done in 1940. Elis employed a rather unusual end play to make his contract of four hearts on today's hand. Study the play of the cards carefully. Then when you meet a similar situation yourself, you will be able to win a top on the hand if you follow his line of play. The opening lead of the king of
