Harrison Canvases Exhibited

Madison's lack of an attractive and suitable gallery for the showing of works of art is made more apparent than ever by the exhibition of the paintings of Mark Harrison currently on the walls of the main floor of the State Historical Society building. In this location these paintings have as much

chance to live as a violet set in concrete.

Mark Harrison is easily the finest landscapist out of nineteenth-century Wisconsin so he ought not be shown under conditions that belong to a brawling frontier. The fault does not lie with either the collector from whom these pictures came or the State Historical Society of Wisconsin which sponsors this

The paintings are on loan from the A. D. Sutherland collection, Fond du Lac. It was in Fond du Lac in 1852 that Harrison first established himself as a Wisconsin painter. Mark Robert Harrison was born of an old English family in Hovringham, Yorkshire, England. His family brought him to America in 1822.

They settled in New York until 1833 when Mark's widowed mother took the family to Hamilton, Ontario. She herself had a gift for art and encouraged this talent when she saw signs of it in her son. Mark

For a year and a half he was under the tutelage of Charles Hilton at the Royal Academy. After that he made a sketch-tour of old architecture in the southern countries. While he was in England he painted a huge historical canvas of "The Charge of cromwell at Marston Moor." This sale established his reputation so firmly that he was able to do well in Europe with paintings even after he came to Fond

One of the pictures on view at the library shows that he must have paid some attention to the seascapes of Turner. Harrison's "The Storm" (painted on tin, unfortunately) is proof that he could, in this genre, give more than a feeble echo of the incomparable Turner.

A fire in a theater where his dioramas were on display destroyed all of the sketches he had brought with him from England, ideas for further painting, and whatever finished canvases he then had in his studio.

He traveled for a time with a theatrical company and in 1849 arrived in Oshkosh where for several years and in partnership with his brother, James, he tried to establish and maintain a steamboat line on Lake Winnebago. An opportunity to study two of his more success-ful landscapes is to be found in the present show. Zimmer on "To Whom God Ap-Side by side on one wall are his "Mount of the Holy Cross" and his "Green Lake, Wisconsin." The former shows his art at its imaginative and sentimental best; a landscape created partly out of actuality, helped along by other paintings he has seen.

As a sign of an earlier Wisconsin we have Harrison's celebrated painting of the first house built in Discussion Fond du Lac. > Harrison is also represented here by studies of Indians, his own portrait, and others together with copies after other paintings. His figure paintings are for the most part less attractive, less convincing

than his landscapes. For this Madison showing fifteen paintings are from the Sutherland collection. Nine others have been added from the collections of the State Historical Society. The twenty-four paintings make it clear that in Mark Harrison we have an artist who deserves a place in the history of painting during the nineteenth century. Let those who have long neld in scorn all modern art now come to give honor to one who sought out the human heart of a subject:


