Abstract on Abstractions

Contemporary art is so varied in scope, its progenitors so different in their views, and its proponents so diverse in their attitudes that some sort of general statement is overdue, and hence thrice welcome.

Such a statement comes from the Institute of Contemporary Art of Boston and New York's Museum of Modern Art and Whitney Museum of American

Art.
The three organizations issued the statement in the hope that it may help to clari-fy current controversial issues about modern art, which are confusing to the public and harmful to the artist. Its object is not to bar honest dif-ferences of opinion, but to state certain broad principles on which we are agreed.

Diversity of viewpoint and style, the statement says, "is a sign of vitality and of the freedom of expression inherent in a democratic society." Recalling the Nazi and Communist theories of ideology in art, the statement adds: 'We oppose any attempt to make art or opinion about are conform to a single point of view." Here are some quotations from the state-

"We affirm our belief in the continuing of what is generally known as modern art . . . At the same time we believe in the validity of conservative and retrospective tendencies when they make creative use of traditional values. We do not assume that modernity in itself is any guarantee of quality or importance.

... We recognize the historic fact that the new in art, as in all other creative activities, is appreciated at first by a relatively small proportion of the public; almost all the art of the next 150 years now growth. past 150 years now generally accepted as good was originally misunderstood, neglected, or ridiculed not only by the public but by many artists, critics, and museum officials.

"We believe that the so-called 'unintelligibility' of some modern art is an inevitable result of its exploration of new frontiers We do not believe that many artists deliberately aim to be unintelligible . . . on the contrary, we believe that most artists today desire communication with a receptive audience. The gap between artist and public . . . has been

greatly exaggerated . ."
"We believe in the humanistic value of modern art even though it may not adhere to academic humanism with its insistence on the human figure as the central element of art .. We recognize the humanistic value of abstract art, as an expression of thought and emotion and the basic human aspiration toward

freedom and order . . "Believing strongly in the quality and vitality of American art, we oppose its definition in narrow nationalistic terms. We hold that the American art which is international in character is as valid as art obviously American in subject

"We also reject the assumption that art which is esthetically an innovation must somehow be socially or politically subversive. We deplore the reckless and ignorant use of polit-

ical or moral terms in attacking modern art." "We believe that there is urgent need for an objective and open-minded attitude toward the art of our time, and for an affirmative faith to match the creative energy and integrity of the

Many of the statements here could be applied (as they themselves suggest) to music, to literature, and to other art forms.

Critics and public alike should recognize by this time that immediate popularity is no criterion of worth; that raillery is not criticism; that unreasoning attack is not judgment; that truth sometimes is discovered only after long

years of contact, experiment, or study. It is a hard lesson, which I confess I am just beginning to learn.




