NEW YORK. (AP) Joseph Nathan Kane is a scholarly, gray-haired man whose occupation is thinking up questions. It isn't a job that keeps him in the limelight—and he's glad. People who go on quiz shows and flub the \$4000 or \$5000 question are likely to be bitter. Frequently they claim they knew the answer all the time, but complain that the way the question was framed was inadequate or confusing.

Right now Joe Kane is devoting all his time to a radio quiz show called "Break the Bank" (NBC). The pay-off in this is strictly cash and the formula involves a series of eight questions of progressive difficulty. By instinct and affection, Kane is a facts chaser. He has written a number of books with titles like "One Thousand Facts Worth Knowing" and "Famous First Facts." From dusty archives he has dug out evidence that one Walter Hunt was the inventor of the sewing machine; that someone was flying before the Wright brothers took off.
