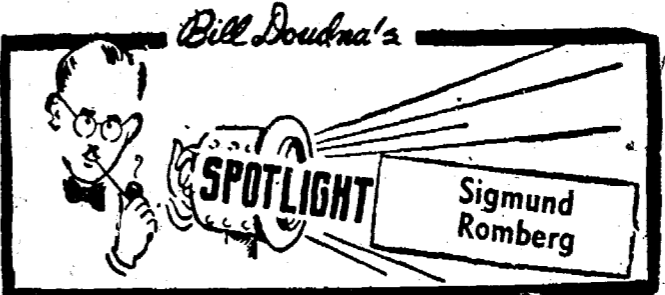

TIP OF THE MORNING: "Theater Guild of the Air" will return in the fall, its sponsor has announced. Original plan was to drop the show at the end of the current run, June 4. The NBC Summer Symphony will be the summer replacement at 7:30 p. m. Sundays on WIBA and WIBA-FM. "Theater Guild" will return, Sept. 10.

Sigmund Romberg bounced through the first half of his program at the Parkway theater Thursday night, apparently as anxious as his audience for the second half—made up of his own compositions. About 1,000 persons greeted the 62-year-old composer-conductor's first-rate orchestra at the first of two concerts; the second house was somewhat smaller.

They dutifully applauded the overworked "Beautiful Galatea" overture and some arias, went strong for a sparkling arrangement of "South Pacific" tunes, and liked other music in the first section.

With Romberg at the piano and the competent Frank Cork conducting, the second period brought music from "Blossom Time," "The Student Prince," "Up in Central Park," and other Romberg hits.

Kirsten Kenyon led the soloists in quality, singing warily; Gail Manners uncorked some topnotch humor in "The Fireman's Bride," and Christina Carroll placed third. Gene Markey, tenor, somehow managed to make "The Lord's Prayer" sound like a love song and "Stouthearted Men" like a ballad.

proaching maturity. The production is not perfect. The interpretation is uneven, some of the crucial scenes lack dramatic power, and many supporting players turn character parts into caricatures.

Nevertheless the play attains moments of real beauty and tenderness.

Thursday's audience was frankly moved by the scenes where a young doctor explains to the mute girl that she is to have a child; again by Belinda's prayer in sign language over her father's body, and by her pledge of marriage.

Mary Louise Durkin's performance as the betrayed girl is touching and altogether convincing and she gets skillful assistance from G. Guy Stallard as the understanding doctor and Don Trachte as her father.

Outstanding in supporting roles were Marjorie Schaffer as the brusque aunt; Earl Thayer as the man who attacks Belinda, and Ann Bjork as a girl caught up in the tragedy.

Other important parts in the large cast were taken by Eleanor Grant, Patricia McKune, Eugene Van Hekle, and Ralph De Sha. The play is directed by Robert Merriman.
