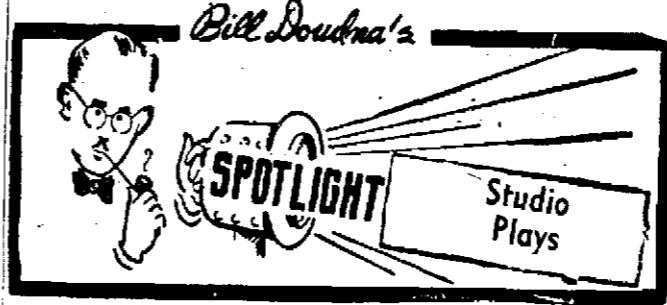

University of Wisconsin talent in acting, play writing, and direction went on parade at the Play Circle of the Memorial Union Tuesday night. Three of the four top plays in a contest conducted by Wisconsin players were presented by the students; they will be repeated at 3:30 and 8 p. m. today.

Ann Clague, freshman from Washington, D. C., turned in the playbill's best performance in the title role of "Edi," a domestic tragedy by H. N. Claus which was the best of the three plays, too.

Miss Clague imparted to the young wife, harassed by a lazy husband and a mind-wandering mother, an emotional intensity which gave the play most of its honest feel of cold tragedy. Bill Wagner was good as the weakling husband.

Miss Clague was able, too, to make credible the sudden changes of mood for which the play called—from scorn to love, from despair to resignation, from anger to sympathy.

Don Newell's comedy, "Manhattan Hermit," opened the bill. Here, John McGeehan depicted, with a smart ear for laughs, a playwright who had shut himself away for five years, only to find that it couldn't go on forever. Helping him learn the lesson was Joan ... as a sophisticated interviewer—whose sophistication vanished with the play's climax. To you more would spoil the fun when you see it.

The closing piece was a fantasy by Newell, "No Carbon Paper," in which a college student, beset by a handicap not revealed until a final scene, dreams in his agony of the things it prevents his going.

Elwin Reynolds played the student, but even his air of sincerity couldn't make the production much more than a series of apparently unrelated scenes. The climax's revelation came too late. Direction was uniformly good. All the plays were marred by two things—an overabundance of trite philosophizing and a harsh

Red River Eases Attack on Winnipeg But Threat Remains

WINNIPEG—(U.P.)—The turbulent Red river eased its 26-day assault on Winnipeg Tuesday, but flood authorities warned that the city would remain in great danger for seven days more.

The rampaging river has shown no rise since Saturday night and has measured 30.1 feet—12.1 above flood level—since Sunday.

But Deputy Provincial Resources Minister D. M. Stephens warned that the flood crest would remain nearly constant for seven more days.

"During the period will be our greatest time of crisis," he said. "Dikes protecting our power, transportation, and hundreds of homes face their most serious strain."

Flood officials said the danger would last until the flood level drops at least 5 feet and cautioned that "that won't be likely for some time."

The 55,000 weary, grimy heroes of the dikes, many of whom have not had a good night's sleep in two weeks, appeared to be winning the battle with the river Tuesday.

Grain Flares Again at U.W. Feed Mill

Firemen were forced to return to the University of Wisconsin feed mill located near the stock pavilion, Tuesday afternoon when ground oats in a feed bin re-ignited.

The feed mill was extensively damaged Monday night when a fire of undetermined origin swept up through the 80-foot tall cement building.

Firemen from No. 4 company stayed on the scene Tuesday for about 30 minutes until the smoldering feed was extinguished.

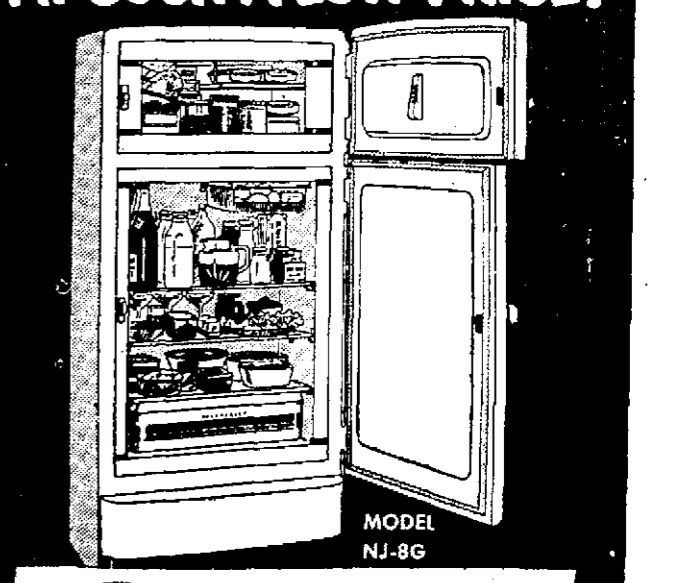
