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Hirohito Sees Daughter Wed \$20-a-Month Clerk

TOKYO, May 20. (AP) Princess Taka, attractive second daughter of Emperor Hirohito, today became plain Mrs. Toshimichi Takatsukasa, wife of a \$20-a-month museum attendant. The wedding took place in the home of Prince Takamatsu, Hirohito's brother. The austere Shinto ceremony was formal and private. It was the first time, so far as is known, that a Japanese emperor saw one of his children married.

Thousands of Japanese lined the route from the imperial palace to the wedding house. The bridegroom's father, Nobusuke, is chief priest at Meiji Jingu, Tokyo's leading Shinto shrine.

Taka, 20, wore a shokeiko, ancient ceremonial dress. A purple hakama billowed like a skirt over a pure white kimono. Covering both was a brilliant red robe with full sleeves, knee-length in front and lengthening to a train in back.

The bride's hair was fashioned in the royal formal style resembling a cobra's hood. She carried a large ceremonial fan tied with brightly colored cords. Takatsukasa, 26, wore formal western morning clothes. The tiny, bespectacled Hirohito, in western dress, and Empress Nagako, wearing a blue kimono, arrived in the big maroon Daimler-Benz with the 16-petal gold chrysanthemum seal. The newlyweds won't have it too tough. The government appropriated the equivalent of \$3,500 for wedding expenses, and gave the princess \$20,000 to "maintain her dignity."

Reds Order Scrap Cargoes Grabbed

BERLIN, May 20. (AP) Soviet Zone authorities have ordered the confiscation of four large loads of scrap metal en route from Berlin to the east. British ships in the harbor, where Communist seizure tactics have piled up a backlog of sixty-three west-bound barges. Only two barges were permitted to proceed yesterday.

New Caledonia Cash

PARIS, May 20. (AP) ECA announced today that \$9,650,000 has been allotted to the south Pacific island of New Caledonia to increase the production of nickel. The equipment is to be paid for in Marshall Plan money made available to French colonies through contracts between the Economic Co-operation Administration (ECA) and the French government.

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Halsey Doubts 'Push-button' Warfare Near

PHILADELPHIA, May 20. (AP) Adm. William F. Halsey Jr. says "push-button" war is around the corner." Insisting that the ordinary fighting man—on land, on sea and in the air—still stands as one of the most vital factors in any future struggle.

Granting that a third world war would be more than ever one of applied science and bring into use deadlier weapons than armies have had to combat heretofore, Halsey declared that trained manpower must remain the main bulwark of the nation's military strength.

The admiral, now retired, spoke yesterday at a luncheon given by patriotic groups in honor of the first Armed Forces day.
