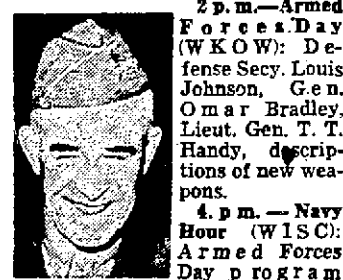

Zor Shriners' Ceremonial Held Today

Those Oriental red robes that will dot Madison's square and uptown streets today identify Zor Shriners who have flocked to the city to observe Zor's father and son ceremonial being held at the Masonic Temple all day today.

The ceremonial is a series of initiation rituals, whereby Masons who already have gone through the York or Scottish Rite degrees are made Shriners. Before today is over there will be at least 65 new Zor Nobles who have trekked the hot sands into Shrinedom.

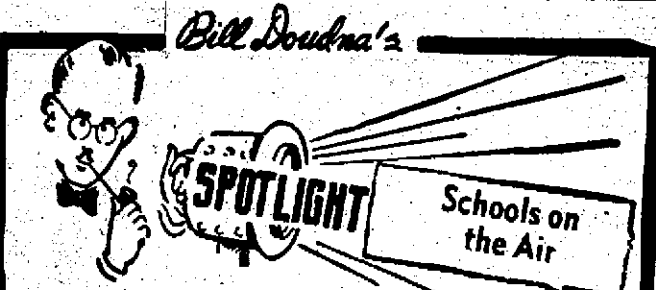
Between 1,200 and 1,500 brother Shriners are expected to attend the program.

While members and candidates register at the temple this morning, the ceremonial proper will not open until 1:45 in the temple auditorium. This afternoon's session will be topped off with a public display of all Zor uniformed units on roped-off Wisconsin avenue in front of the temple.

Following a buffet dinner in the temple dining room, the evening program will open with a grand entry of all units, the Zor officers, and a flag ceremony at 7 p. m.

At the close of the final initiation, section the membership will adjourn to Turner hall for a star party featuring a professional floor show and Dutch lunch.

Many of the Shriners and their wives came to Madison Friday to attend the spring dance sponsored in the Hotel Loraine by Zor's Charity and Activity assn. for the benefit of the Shrine crippled children's hospitals.

BACH MASS: Johann Sebastian Bach never heard a complete performance of his great "B Minor Mass," which the Madison community will hear for the first time at 2:30 p. m. Sunday in the University of Wisconsin stock pavilion.

The University Men's, Women's, and University choruses, a total of 200 voices, and 50 members of the University Symphony orchestra will present the work as a commemoration of the 200th anniversary of Bach's death and as a musical climax of Parents' Weekend on the campus.

Bach was 52 years old when he completed the mass, after six years of work. The "Credo" was probably written first, in 1731 or 1732. The "Crucifixus" was composed as early as 1729 and the "Kyrie" and "Gloria" followed in 1732. The date of the "Sanctus" was 1735 and the entire work was completed by 1737.

The "Kyrie" and "Gloria" portions were presented by the composer to the Duke of Saxony when Bach petitioned him for the office of Court Kapellmeister.

Dr. Fuchs to Be Questioned by FBI
WASHINGTON (AP)—J. Edgar Hoover disclosed Friday that two FBI men have gone to London to question Dr. Klaus Fuchs, British scientist convicted of passing atomic secrets to Russia.

Hoover, FBI chief, said in response to an inquiry, "Asst. FBI Director U. H. Clegg and Special Agent Robert J. Lampher have arrived in London for the purpose of interviewing Dr. Fuchs."

It is known, however, that the FBI has been anxious to question Fuchs. Presumably, it has been concerned chiefly about possible contacts in the United States.

Fuchs was a frequent visitor to this country in the war and post-war days and the FBI cooperated with the British intelligence service in breaking the case leading to his conviction. Fuchs is serving a 14-year sentence.

Presumably, Fuchs has agreed to questioning by the FBI men. During a parliament debate this week, Home Secretary Chuter Ede said Fuchs would be questioned by American agents only if Fuchs was agreeable.

U. W. VILLAGE FAIR

Railroads Reduce Weekend Round Trip Fares to Milwaukee

The two railroads running between Madison and Milwaukee announced Friday a lower fare for weekend travelers between the two points, designed to compete with buses for student transportation.

Both the Milwaukee road and the North Western will lower the round trip fare from \$4.26 to \$2.88 beginning June 2. The present bus fare is \$3.22. All the figures include tax.

The special rate will apply only on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday departures for Milwaukee. The return time limit from Milwaukee will be midnight on Monday of the same weekend. The North Western now runs two round trip trains daily while the Milwaukee runs three daily.

On the Milwaukee road the special rate will apply not only from Madison but also from Marquette, Sun Prairie, and Waterloo while on the North Western the rate will apply from Madison, Cottage Grove, Deerfield, and London.

Feast of Weeks, Jewish Festival to Begin Sunday

One of the most beautiful and spiritual festivals in the Jewish religious calendar, Shovuos, or the Feast of Weeks, will begin at sundown Sunday.

The end of the Holy Day is at sundown Monday, except for Orthodox and Conservative Jews, who end their observance at sundown Tuesday.

Services for the Festival of Shovuos will be conducted at the B'nai Brith Hillel Foundation at 7:30 p. m. Sunday.

Historically, the day commemorates the giving of the Ten Commandments on Mt. Sinai, and the establishment of the covenant between God and Israel. It is named the Feast of Weeks because it completes seven weeks from the day when the new barley was taken to the Ancient Temple in Jerusalem. On the 30th day the early wheat harvest is celebrated. The Book of Ruth is read on this festival.

The Hebrew date is Sivan 6, 5710.
