In addition, I shall choose another state network program as the one "which has most consistently fostered the cause of contemporary music." It is the "FM Concert," aired each night at 9.

While network programs have given us more than the usual amount of contemporary music this season, no one series has "consistently" fostered its cause. And, to my knowledge, no local programs have done it, either.

Whether Musical America, the magazine conducting the poll, will accept a vote for a series in the "outstanding event" classification is open to question, but after all the Schoenberg concerts comprised a unit, even though they were broadcast at intervals.




