

The Sunday Spotlight Summer Replacements Begin

With fresh rhubarb pies, onions right smack out of the garden, and iced tea on the menu and brightly-hued, home-grown flowers on the table, summer is here for sure. So the radio schedules are changing rapidly, with lots of new shows booked in the next fortnight or so.



Some summer series have already begun—for example, Carmen Dragon's "Starlight Concerts" in place of Fannie Brice. It's a sweet summer show, and more are coming.

- Percy Faith's orchestra, on CBS at 6 p.m. Sundays beginning June 4;
- The Steve Allen show, audience-participation series, on CBS at 4:30 p.m. Sundays beginning June 4;
- "Hit the Jackpot," returning to the air via CBS at 5:30 p.m. Sundays beginning today;
- "Guy Lombardo Time," on CBS at 5 p.m. Sundays beginning June 4;
- Summer version of Gordon MacRae show, with straight musical program replacing operettas, on NBC at 7 p.m. Mondays, beginning this week;
- "One Man's Family" becomes five-day series on NBC at 6 p.m. Monday through Friday beginning June 5;
- "Chicago Theater of the Air" with concerts replacing operas and operettas, on Mutual at 9 p.m. Saturdays beginning this week;
- "Satan's Waitin'," psychological mystery dramas, on CBS at 6:30 p.m. Tuesdays beginning June 6;
- "A Life in Your Hands," by Erle Stanley Gardner,

ner, returns on NBC at 8:30 p.m. Tuesdays beginning June 20;

"Detour," horror series, on ABC at 8 p.m. Wednesdays beginning June 21;

"ABCs of Music," with Robert Q. Lewis and Ralph Flanagan's orchestra, on CBS at 7:30 p.m. Wednesdays beginning this week;

"Starlight Concerts," from Texas State fairgrounds on CBS at 5 p.m. Saturdays beginning June 10.

Informality is a saving grace on many radio shows, but it can be carried too far.

"Think Fast," on ABC Sunday afternoons, is a case in point.

It's an unusual quiz program, depending for a good deal of its flavor and success on its spontaneity. But when the listener can't make out what's being said because several performers are talking at once, wit and brightness have about as much value as a wilted dandelion.

Poliomyelitis last week ended a promising radio career.

Don Hornsby, a concert pianist and composer who had turned to comedy, went to New York from Los Angeles a few weeks ago to audition for a television show on NBC. The audition was a success, and the 26-year-old funmaker was signed to a five-year contract. NBC immediately began a buildup for Hornsby and his "creeshism," which he defined as "constructive escapism."

But polio struck him, and Hornsby died Monday in a hospital at White Plains, N. Y.

The versatile Hornsby gave his first professional concert when he was 7. Five years ago, he played his own "My Blues for Johnny" in a recital in Carnegie Chamber Music hall.

While in the marine corps, he contracted spinal meningitis, but recovered.

Uncle Ray's Corner Wasp Story Doubted

A century and a half ago there was a man in Spain who had a hard time making people believe him. His name was De Azara and he had been in South America working for the Spanish government. Today we know that certain parts of South America have large numbers of "honey wasps." Argentina and Uruguay have them, as well as Paraguay.

"I spent 13 years in South America," said De Azara, "and helped to settle the limits of Paraguay. While I was doing that work I saw wasps which made honey."

People Doubted Story

Almost everyone to whom he told the story had something like this to reply:

"Honey from wasps! You must have made a mistake. You must have supposed that wild bees were the same as wasps. Wasps make paper, but not honey."

"No," replied De Azara, "I did not make a mistake. The insects I saw were wasps, not bees, and their nests contained honey!"

The years passed and the poor Spaniard could find few persons who would take his word for what he had seen. Some declared that he was not making a mistake but was saying something he knew was not true.

Scientist Studied Nests

Then, at last, a package reached the British Museum in London, a package which contained wasps' nests from South America. A scientist, Dr. Adam White, studied

the combs in the nests, and found that they held dry honey. He wrote about the fact in a magazine, and the good name of De Azara as a man of truth was brought back.

Today we know that certain parts of South America have large numbers of "honey wasps." Argentina and Uruguay have them, as well as Paraguay.

Nests 2 Feet High

Honey wasps built nests about 2 feet high and one foot wide. The outside covering is thicker than is found about the nests of most wasps; it is more like cardboard than paper.

Honey wasps are fond of the sweet juices of plants, including the nectar of flowers. They also feed on insects, but the wasps need honey to use during the cold season.

For most enemies, the thick covering of the honey wasps' nest is a good protection, but not for one kind of enemy. The big, fierce animal known as a jaguar likes honey, and with one stroke of its paw breaks in the wall of the nest. Dozens of wasps may sting the jaguar, but it manages to get the honey which is stored in the combs.

Another Strange Wasp

The spider-wasp is another strange member of the wasp tribe. This wasp is about 2 inches long, and is fairly common in Brazil.

The spider-wasp digs into the ground to make a nest. While dig-
