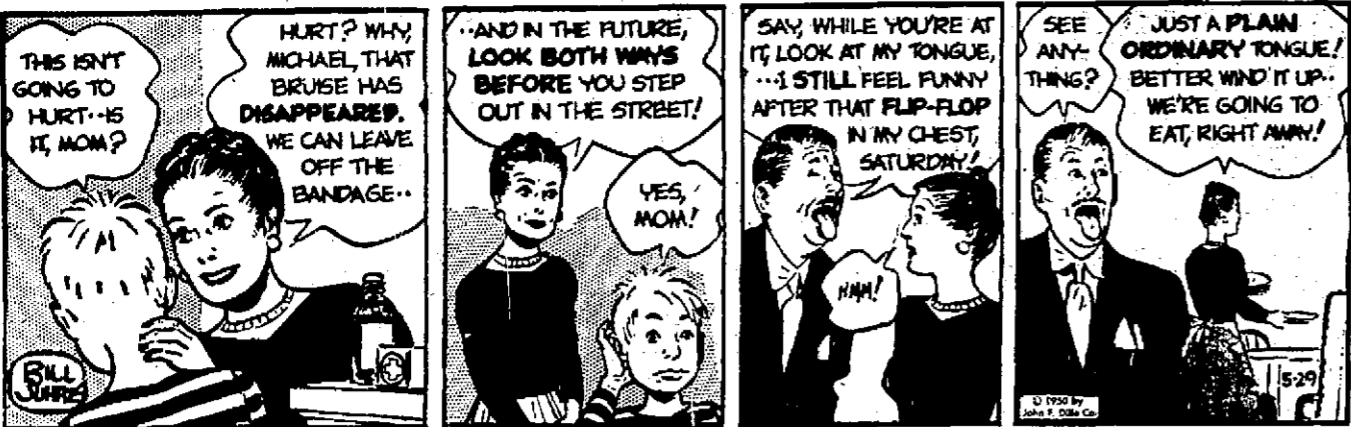

Son Held After Death of Mississippi Lawyer

GULFPORT, Miss.—(UP)—The lawyer-son of a prominent Gulf coast attorney, a former mental patient, was held in Harrison county jail here Sunday on a charge of murdering his father. Thomas Gardner, 33, was arrested after a coroner's jury was told that 73-year-old Hanan Gardner was apparently beaten to death and then placed near the center of a dynamite explosion last Sunday. The attorney's body was found outside and partially under his automobile, which was badly damaged by the explosion of a bomb in the glove compartment. The death apparently occurred at the Gardner farm near here. Sheriff Laze Quave said the exact cause of death was not known, and that opinion was divided between death in the blast and death before it.

State Sanitary Engineer Named to Committees

Muegge, 656 Crandall st., sanitary engineer with the state board of health, has been appointed to two committees in the Conference of State Sanitary Engineers which met recently in Washington, D. C. He will serve on the recharge waters committee, which seeks to encourage conservation and replenishment of underground water supplies, and the water fluoridation policy committee, now studying developments in the use of fluoride compounds in public drinking water supplies to combat tooth decay in children.

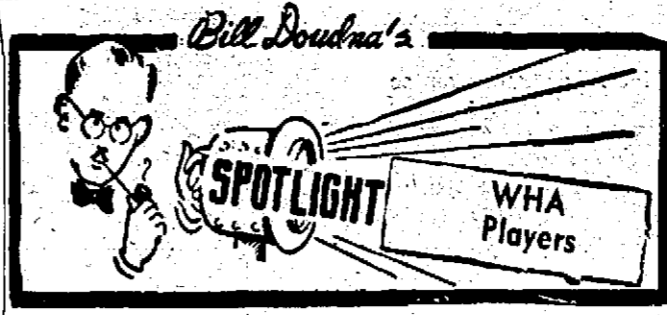

Acheson to Ask 2nd Instalment To Further Arming of Democratic Allies

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson will ask congress this week for a second instalment of \$1,250,000,000 to continue arming this nation's democratic allies against possible Russian attack. Senate leaders, including some who opposed the original military assistance program, said there was an "excellent" chance the request will be approved in view of the "solid" economic and military achievements of the West in the past year. The proposed program will include about \$1,000,000,000 in new cash and contract authority for the North Atlantic pact nations and perhaps \$150,000,000 to shore up the defenses of Greece, Turkey, Korea, Iran, and the Philippines. In addition, Acheson may request \$100,000,000 to be spent in the "general area" of China. Most of this money presumably would be earmarked for Indo-China, the Malay Peninsula, and Southeast Asia, where a Red thrust is in full swing. The request is intended to back up the original \$1,000,000,000 arms program under which bombers,
